### Author Dies In Nova Scotia At 37

LOCKEPORT, N.S. (CP)—Funeral services will be held today for M. A. Sutherland, Canadian literary critic and author who died in Toronto following a three-month illness. He was 37.  
Working from a hospital bed before his death, he completed for publication a review of the works of E. J. Pratt, Newfoundland poet, and an edition of the Northern Review, of which he was editor.  
His review of Pratt's works was published three weeks before his death.  
Born in Liverpool, N.S., Mr. Sutherland received his education there and in Saint John, N.B. He attended Queen's and McGill Universities and the University of Toronto. He was working toward his masters degree when he became paralyzed through cancer.  
Surviving are his wife, the former Audrey Alkman of Toronto; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Sutherland, Bridgewater, N. A.; two sisters, Betty (Mrs. Irving Layton) Montreal, and Mary Louise (Mrs. R. E. Jeffrey) Montreal; two brothers, Donald and Fred, Toronto.

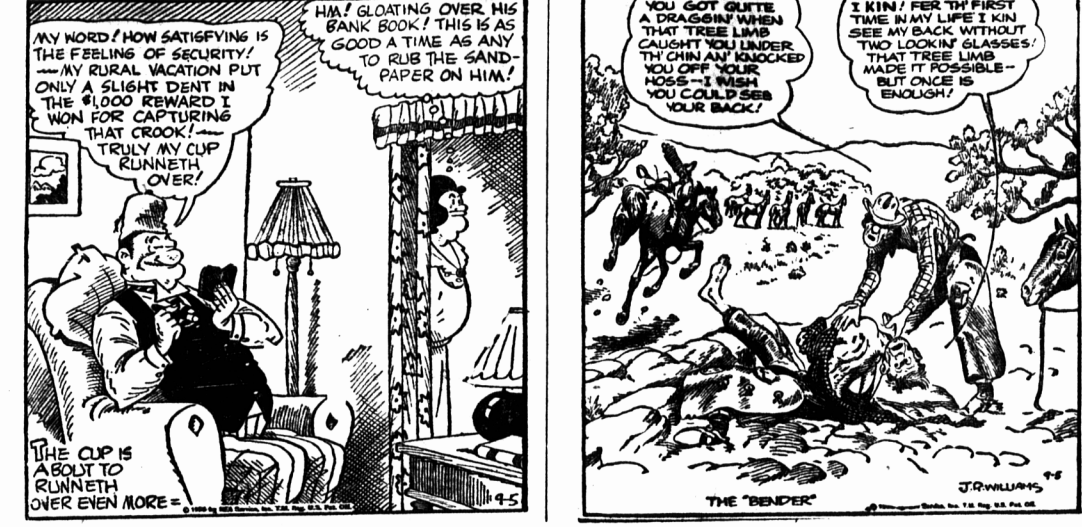

### CONTRACT BRIDGE By B. Jay Becker

(Top Record-Holder in Masters' Individual Championship Play)  
South dealer.  
Neither side vulnerable.  
NORTH  
♠ A J 10 9 5

The bidding:  
1 South West North East

Opening lead—five of clubs.  
The principle that a new suit named by the responder forces the opener to bid again is uniformly accepted in all circles. If the responder on his second bid names another new suit, the force on the opening bid continues unabated.  
There is one exception, though. To the latter rule. If the opener's rebid over the first response was the sign-off bid of one no-trump, a new suit named by the responder is not forcing unless it is also a jump bid. This accounts for North's three heart bid.  
Everyone is familiar with the technique of holding up the play of an ace in notrump contracts when the defenders have attacked the declarer's weakest suit. The purpose is to exhaust one of the defenders of that suit and thereby sever adverse communications.  
The same principle is similarly applied to the holdup of the king, if the ace has already been played. It is not so well known, though, that this principle can be extended to the Q-J combination.  
When East wins the opening club lead with the king and returns the nine, South is subject to defeat if he covers the return with the jack. All West has to do is refuse to win the trick and when, later in the play, East obtains the lead with his king of spades, another club return traps South's queen and breaks the contract.  
The correct play at trick two is to play the six of clubs or East's nine. This concedes the defense three club tricks immedately but prevents them from taking four ultimately.  
South has nine tricks on tap when the club nine is returned counting his spades, unless the defender in the meantime gets four club tricks. He should be willing to lose the first three club tricks and eventually the king of spades (if East has it) because this leaves him with exactly nine tricks.  
By ducking the nine of clubs for North's three heart bid, a double objective. He limits the club losers to three while, at the same time, he insures the contract.
