### John Was 81 On Sunday

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope John XXIII, celebrating his 81st birthday Sunday, said he does not know if he will live to see 82—and is not excessively worried about it.

The Pope was up with the dawn to travel to the pontifical University of the Sacred Theology of the Faith. He offered mass at a university high on Rome's Janiculum Hill, where students train for the priesthood.

"We are at the start of our 82nd year," he said in a talk to four cardinals, dozens of bishops and hundreds of seminarians and alumni from 60 nations.

"Will we arrive at the end of it? We are not excessively concerned. Any day is a good day to be born and any day is a good day to die."

### New RC School Burns In Nfld.

BRIGUS, Nfld. (CP)—A new Roman Catholic school valued between \$50,000 and \$70,000 was destroyed by fire at nearby Maryvale Sunday. The wooden frame building, which had classrooms for 150 children and four teachers, was opened in September. It was not known how the fire started.

### Beef Cattle Prices Slip

### Hope Fades For Hunter

INVERNESS, N. S. (CP)—The fifth day of searching for hunter Truman Read of Napton, N.S., ended fruitlessly Sunday and searchers were losing hope the 30-year-old man would be found alive.

Read has been missing since Tuesday when he became separated from hunting companions in rugged woods near Lake Ainslie. More than 100 men, an RCMP dog and an RCMP helicopter were in the search Sunday.

Temperatures Sunday night were below freezing. Read was lightly clothed.

### Bird Is Blamed For Air Crash

ELLIOTT CITY, Md. (AP)—Federal investigators said Saturday that an air traffic controller crashed Friday killing all 17 persons aboard his large bird shortly before the crash which "could have had a serious effect on the plane."

Edward Slatery of the Civil Aeronautics Board told the Associated Press that remains of a large bird—probably a goose or swan—were found on the left stabilizer of the United Air Lines Viscount. He said the stabilizer had been punctured by the plane.

The plane crashed and burned on a farm 10 miles southwest of Baltimore.

### Operator Pinned As Crane Topples

SOURIS BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN—Forty-nine-year-old Joseph H. Simon Chaisson, Bear River South, spent a perilous two hours Saturday trapped beneath a large construction crane and a wharf piling at Naufrage approximately 15 miles from Souris.

He is a patient in the Charlottetown Hospital, where he is reported to be suffering from a badly crushed leg and other injuries to his right foot.

The accident occurred at approximately 10:15 while Mr. Chaisson was operating the crane at the Naufrage wharf extension project. It was reported he was operating the crane around the wharf pilings when the ground beneath the machine gave way and the machine started to tip.

Mr. Chaisson got out of the machine but got "caught in part of the machinery. When he had his foot he became pinned between it and one wharf piling. The machine landed in such a way that it was delicately balanced on the piling so that any movement would topple it into the water.

Follow workers were two hours getting Mr. Chaisson to safety. The only way they could get him from under the crane was with the aid of a hammer and chisel.

He was taken to hospital in Perry's ambulance from Souris.

### 60 Are Expected To File Nomination

Candidates will nominate today in the three counties. They have up until 4 p.m. to file nomination papers with county returning officers, Benjamin Gallant, Charlottetown; Queens County; Daniel MacLean, Digby; and Peter McEwen, Summerside.

It is expected the election will be a two-way fight between Progressive Conservative Government candidates and those of the Liberal opposition.

The New Democrats have announced they will not enter and until last night no Social Credit or Independents were in sight.

Conservative and Liberal party conventions have named full slate for the 30 seats in the legislature.

### China Offers Pakistan Pact

RAWALPINDI, (Pakistan) (AP)—Informal sources said Saturday Red China has offered to sign a non-aggression treaty with Pakistan, a defence partner of the Western powers which is irritated now by United States and British arms aid to India.

Parliamentary quarters reported the offer is under study by the government of Premier Mohammed Ayub Khan. Foreign Minister Mohammed Ali retorted comment, but said he has accepted an invitation from Premier Chou En-lai to visit China soon.

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### Prison Escapee Is Apprehended

SPRINGFIELD, N.S. (CP)—A 27-year-old escapee from the minimum security prison here was apprehended by RCMP Saturday after more than three days and nights of freedom.

Wilbur Warren Durning, a native of Economy, N.S., was captured in a farm house at South Brook about eight miles from here.

Police said Durning, earlier described as potentially dangerous, gave "no trouble."

He was taken to Amherst where he was treated for frost-bite.

### NDPs In N.B. Plan Convention

FREDERICTON (CP)—The founding convention of the New Democratic Party in New Brunswick is to be held here the weekend of Dec. 1. More than 300 delegates from all parts of the province are expected to attend.

Tom Barnett, newly elected member of parliament for the British Columbia riding of Coombs-Albernia, will head the speakers list. His topic will be "the advance of socialism in a more civilized part of Canada."

### Tito Planning Russian Visit

BELGRADE (Reuters)—Yugoslav President Tito is expected to go to the Soviet Union early next month for a "vacation" which probably will include major policy talks with Premier Khrushchev in the thawing climate of Russian-Yugoslav relations.

### Russians Seen Preparing To Dismantle Cuban Bases

WASHINGTON (AP)—An official U.S. source said Sunday a nuclear dismantling of non-nuclear Soviet military bases in Cuba is expected by United States officials to follow Premier Khrushchev's withdrawal of weapons with nuclear caps.

Russian diplomats are reported to have told U.S. representatives recent days that several thousand more Soviet troops will be sent to Cuba.

### Bounty Sails For Halifax

BALTIMORE—(CP)—The moving ship Bounty unfurled her 10,000 square feet of sails Saturday and departed for Halifax. The Bounty is a full-sized copy of the famous ship crewed by 12 men and inspired by a picture and a film based on the reveal.

Baltimore was the last stop on a 50,000-mile voyage by the Bounty to advertise the motion picture. She sailed for Nova Scotia, which is her winter port, because most of the crew members come from there.

### FIGHTING LULL CONTINUES

Red China Cease Fire Is Called Manipulation

NEW DELHI (Reuters)—An Indian government spokesman Sunday described Communist China's cease-fire proposals in the Sino-Indian border war as a "clever manipulation."

Meanwhile, Prime Minister Nehru met with the Indian national defence council as American and British military aid experts travelled to the front lines of the mountainous northern frontier.

The Indian statement described the Chinese offer as an attempt to present the border line that existed Nov. 7, 1959, as the same line that exists today after "massive attacks" by the Chinese.

"If the position on Nov. 7, 1959, was the same as today, as the Chinese government claimed, why was it necessary for the Chinese to mount massive attacks to gain further Indian territory?" the Indian spokesman asked.

The Indians have repeatedly demanded that both sides return to the situation that existed Sept. 8, 1962, before the latest fighting in the dispute broke out.

Gen. Paul D. Adams, commander-in-chief of the U.S. strike command, flew to the Assam Plains for an on-the-spot study of the frontier situation with Gen. Sir Richard Hill, chief of the British imperial general staff, and Indian military leaders.

MEETS NEHRU  
In New Delhi, U.S. Assistant State Secretary Averell Harriman met with Nehru for the third time in four days to discuss the border situation. Harriman and British Commonwealth Relations Secretary Duncan Sandys earlier met separately with Indian Finance Minister Indira Gandhi on Sunday, their continuing aid to China.

Both Britain and the U.S. have flown large shipments of infantry weapons for use in the border conflict and huge U.S. (Continued on Page 13, Col. 5)

### 5 Children Die In Fire

LONDON, Oct. 27 (CP)—Five children died Sunday in an early-morning fire which swept through the home of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Patton, in London's northeast section.

The children's bodies were found in and near their beds on the seven-room, fire-damaged second floor. The dead are Teena, 2, Sherry, 4, Carmen, 6, LaStarza, 8, and Randy, 12.

Mr. and Mrs. Patton were in satisfactory condition in hospital recovering from burns and shock.

Cause of the fire has not been determined yet.

### Aircraft Crash Takes Two Lives

QUEBEC (CP)—A light aircraft crashed Sunday at St. Jean de la Lande, about 30 miles south of here, taking two lives.

The victims were identified as Jacqueline Vachon, 23, of St. Evariste de Beauce, and Gaston Hiale, 34, of St. Honoré de Beauport.

Details of the crash were not immediately available.

Transport department officials in Quebec have been called in to investigate.

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
