## Increase In N. H. L. Playoff Pool One Result Of Meeting

PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Instead of recognizing the NHL Players on the National Hockey League and Stanley Cup champion teams this year may each receive as much as \$4,000 as a result of a parley between NHL player representatives and club owners here.

Increases in the playoff pool and in minimum salaries were among benefits for players agreed upon in a 13-hour meeting which ended early Wednesday. League President Clarence Campbell said the agreement was effective immediately and includes this season.

## Royals Await Results Of Vote To Determine Fate

Pius Callaghan, Prince Edward Island's vice-president of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association, asked last night for a telegraph vote of the Association to determine whether Charlottetown's Royals will be able to enter Maritime Hockey playoffs in mid-March now that the Maritime Hockey League has been disbanded and Amherst and Summerside have agreed to go into an immediate playoff with the winner to go into Allan Cup play-offs.

Mr. Callaghan said last night that E. L. Casey had pledged to the M.A.H.A. on request of the Royals management. In conversation with Mr. Callaghan and Earl Nicholson, Manager of the Sports Arena yesterday it was learned that the Maritime Hockey League was disbanded when its president, E. L. Casey, Amherst told the M.A.H.A. that the league wished to go into Allan Cup play-offs which are starting immediately.

According to Mr. Nicholson, the Amherst men had phoned Summerside prior to his appearance at the M.A.H.A. meeting in Halifax last weekend and Summerside had stated that they did not wish to go into the Allan Cup play-offs. Charlottetown had no desire to do so either although Casey said he had tried to reach Charlottetown officials for comment without success.

Mr. Nicholson said last night that the league had been disbanded with three weeks of the agreed schedule remaining. For that he criticized the league president and also the M.A.H.A. whose action, he suggested, was not in keeping with their stated policy of encouraging and developing hockey in the Maritimes.

The local hockey people asked the M.A.H.A. to do something about it but the reply from the organization was that this is a league matter in which they do not interfere.

## Johnson Rink Pulls Two Upsets In Opening Play
