MONTAGUE Two wild cattle have recently been subdued and captured after being captured following the use of a tranquilizer gun in the Montague area. Both animals were considered to be dangerous and could not be kept confined to their pasture and had been wandering from one herd of cattle to another in the area.

The hunters, V.A. (Joe) Fraser and George Mair who joined in the capture agreed this gun method was more humane than shooting with a rifle.
