## Branch Opens In City Of Canada Permanent

Hon. F. W. Hyndman yesterday officially opened the newest branch of Canada Permanent, a trust and mortgage agency, at a ceremony at the company's offices on Kent Street.

Mr. Hyndman's company had previously represented the agency since 1964.

Present for the ceremony were representatives of insurance, banking and trust companies and provincial and civic dignitaries, including Lt. Gov. W. J. MacDonald, Mayor Walter Cox and Mr. Justice R. B. Bell.

W. Leo Knowlton, executive vice-president and general manager of Canada Permanent, presided over the opening.

Among the large number of Canada Permanent officials present was Theodore "Teddy" Bayer, a native of Charlottetown.

Briefly introduced by Mr. Knowlton were D.H. Stanhope, manager of the new branch, and N.J.B. McNeil, accountant. Also on the staff is Arnold W. Clark, formerly of Victoria, B.C., and four girl clerks, all Charlottetown residents. Two other girls were also on the temporary staff. All of them wore corsages for the ceremony, gifts of the company.

The company offices, located in the Burke Building, provide beautiful accommodations for

the wide variety of services. Can-lighting, easy tile floors, wide counters and plenty of space combine with beautifully appointed private offices with paneled walls and thick wall to wall carpeting. Officials expressed their pleasure with the new quarters, and owner Carl F. Burke, present for the opening, received many congratulations on the building planned by architect Keith Pickard and constructed by Jack Wilson, contractor.

In his brief remarks, Mr. Knowlton in relating the history of his company said it was founded in 1881 to consolidate the work of a century of achievement into a few words as he said Canada Permanent was founded 12 years before Confederation. An agency was established in Newfoundland 60 years ago while the company had been operating in Western Canada in 1881. Today, he said, they have branches from coast to coast and is the largest loan company in the country with the greatest volume of customer deposits and mortgage investments.

He stated his firm looks on the names Hyndman and Prince Edward Island as synonymous because of the long association of the three. F. Walter Hyndman personally has been their representative here since 1937, he stated, as he paid tribute to the interest taken by the Island's former lieutenant governor whom he then called upon to officially open the branch.

## Four Are Fined For Fuel Theft

Charged with the theft of fuel oil valued at less than \$50, Stephen Joseph Vienot, Toronto; James Joseph Vienot, Toronto; Michael Frederick Day of Weston, Ont., and Wallace Lee Brander of French River, were each fined \$25 and costs when they appeared before Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C. in Queen's County Magistrate's Court Monday morning.

The charges all arose out of the same incident when the youths, all travelling in the same car, ran out of gas and took some fuel off thinking it to be gas from a tank on a farm near French River.

They had, they said, attempted to wake the occupants of the farm house but to no avail.

They were each fined \$25 and costs or 15 days in jail.

William Pineau of North Rustico was fined \$20 and costs when he pleaded guilty to a

charge of causing a disturbance in a public place.

For failing to stop at the scene of an accident, Henry Albert Perry of Sherwood was fined \$35 and costs.

A woman was fined \$20 and costs for the illegal possession of liquor.

## Organ Concert Time Changed

Jerry Gerard, noted English organist, will give a concert at St. Anthony's Church, Bloomfield, tonight at 9 o'clock, sponsored by C.J. Gallant Co.

A fourth generation organist — his father, grandfather and great-grandfather were organ

builders — Mr. Gerard began his career at the age of nine. He served as church organist, and at 16 he began his studies at the Royal Manchester College of Music.

His concert tours have spanned Europe, Canada and the United States, and he has made over 200 television appearances in North America.

The time of the concert was originally announced as 8 o'clock.

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## Five Appear At Summerside On Impaired Driving Charges

SUMMERSIDE — Three persons were found guilty of impaired driving charges, a fourth entered a not guilty plea to a similar charge and had his case adjourned to May 6, and a fifth requested an adjournment without plea to May 6 in Prince County Court yesterday before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald.

Joseph Edward Galant, 20, of Portage, and Lawrence Acif Harvey of MacNeill's Mills entered guilty pleas and were each fined \$75 and costs while Edward Francis Melver of Kirkora, who had entered a not guilty plea at an earlier hearing, was found guilty following the testimony of four witnesses.

Bernard St. Clair McCabe represented the accused while George R. McMahon acted for the crown.

Camille Joseph Gallant of Abram's Village pleaded not

guilty to an impaired driving charge and his case was adjourned to May 6 for a date to be set. Robert Austin O'Brien of St. Eleanor's had his case also adjourned to May 6. No plea was taken in this case.

Charges of speeding against Philip John Kinch, Alberton South, William Walter Craiz, Middleton and Richard George Taylor, Charlottetown, were withdrawn by the crown as a result of a legal technicality.

J. Kenneth Tychoz and Donald Hunter of Summerside and Scott Linkletter of Linkletter Road were each fined \$10 and costs on speeding charges.

Residents of Halifax, Summerside and Poplar Grove were each fined \$20 and costs on charges of unlawful possession while a Berden man was sentenced to 30 days in Prince County jail on a charge of being intoxicated in a public place.

## Budget Disappoints Shaw; Wants Aid For Education

Disappointment that nothing was done to relieve or completely remove the 11 per cent sales tax on building materials was expressed yesterday by Premier Walter R. Shaw in a comment on the federal budget.

Because the province has to import lumber and other building materials the 11 per cent tax left "a serious financial obligation on construction work" in the province.

He said it had been estimated the tax adds almost \$2,000 to the cost of a well-built home.

The premier said the tax affects everyone — the farmer, fisherman and laborer, including those not affected so much by income tax.

Premier Shaw said he "noticed no reference to education" in last night's budget. He said "costs of education in this province are very high and we are spending a lot of money to educate our youth. If we are to keep our standards of education up to that of other provinces, our costs will likely be higher than any other province."

The premier said the province is greatly in need of relief at the federal level on educational costs and suggested that help could be given in capital construction and maintenance costs.

Commenting on the proposed 10 per cent reduction in income tax, the premier said, "this will not benefit the average citizen to any great extent but a reduction or elimination of the sales tax would mean something for everyone."

The premier said he did not have time to study the new budget fully and added "no doubt there will be other matters to comment on after a careful examination of the provisions of the budget."

In conclusion, the premier said "if the budget had eliminated the sales tax and included some form of assistance for education, I would call it a fairly decent kind of a document."
