DIED IN BOSTON.—We regret to hear that Mr. Hector McLean, brother of Mrs. W. H. Barnard, of Summerside, died at Boston on Friday last of typhoid fever. Mr. McLean spent the early part of last summer in Summerside for the benefit of his health, which was not very good at the time. He was of a quiet, unobtrusive nature, and was much esteemed by all who knew him.

WATER WORKS EXPENDITURE.—The statement of the expenditure on the Amherst water works shows that the total cost of the works from the conception in September, 1890, up to November 3rd, last, was \$65,066, the amount borrowed being \$80,000. The cost includes all charges for investigations, plans, surveys and construction of the work. The total number of applicants supplied with the water is 160, the proceeds from which amount to over \$1,000.

SKATING.—The first race of the series between Harold Hagen, of Christiania, Norway, and Hugh J. McCormick took place at the Normans Skating Club Rink, Minneapolis, Minn., on Monday night, in the presence of a very large crowd. The race was three miles, and the Norwegian won quite easily by fifty feet in 9.47. The ice was in fine condition, and Hagen skated with a grace and ease that won for him hundreds of admirers. Hagen's time of 9.47 is not extra fast, as in the Victoria Rink, St. John, four years ago, McCormick skated three miles in 9.48, fourteen laps to the mile, while Monday night's track was four laps. Hagen's best recorded time for three miles in Norway is 8.40.25, and Joe Donoghue's is 9.17.

ALL indications now point to the opening of the rink next Monday night. The ice is being made more rapidly than in any former year, the foundation now being secure, and a splendid sheet of ice will greet the eyes of skaters. As a Christmas present nothing seems more appropriate than a Rink ticket, and it is to be hoped that a very large number of our citizens will take advantage this winter of this very healthy exercise. The Citizens' Band will discourse their usual good music on Monday and Thursday evenings, and Saturday afternoons.

THE SEWERAGE MATTER.—The plans and specifications of a system of sewerage for the city were received last evening, and may be seen at the office of the City Clerk. There is no material difference in the specifications from the report submitted to the Council some time ago by Col. Waring. The actual surveys made by Mr. Swinburne show the grade and graduation to be much better than Colonel Waring thought they would be when he was here, and, therefore, the construction will be much easier. The plans are drawn on a scale suitable to a supposed population of 25,000 people. The estimated cost of construction is \$135,533.40, but as this estimate is based on high water, Col. Waring expects some reduction in the actual work. Col. Waring suggests that the reservoir be placed at Pownal wharf.
