As previously announced, election day is Wednesday, February 23, 1972. The one polling station on campus will be situated in the gym. There will also be one auxiliary station downtown for members of the Home Economics and Music departments. The polls will be opened at 9:00 A.M. and closed at 5:00 P.M.

Any student who is a regular member of the Student Union on the day of the election is eligible to vote for candidates in his constituency. A student who is qualified as an eligible voter may vote in only one constituency. Each voter is eligible to cast one vote for each seat being contested in his constituency.
