# Canada's Exports Again Reach New-Record Mark

## U.S. Steel

**CLEVELAND (AP) —** Orders from the booming construction industry have been instrumental in the strengthening of demand for steel products, steel, the metalworking weekly, reports Sunday. The weekly said this year's steel business is practically wrapped up, with order books for some products having been closed for the rest of 1955 by some producers. Some mills have only six weeks of space left on other products it adds.

Two price increases were cited as proof of demand for steel products. Phoenix Iron and Steel Co., of Phoenixville, Pa., raised its price on standard and wide flange structural sections \$10 a ton above its competitors' prices. Central Iron and Steel Co., Harrisburg, Pa., raised its price on carbon plates \$12 a ton above that of other firms.

**CONSTRUCTION BIG TAKER** The construction industry is the big taker of the products of Phoenix and Central, the magazine says.

The American Institute of Steel Construction reports June bookings for structural steel were the highest since April, 1951, and the orders still are rolling in.

But the steel industry is not without its handicaps, such as no weather, equipment breakdowns and labor troubles.

In the week ending today U.S. steel ingot production declined 3 points to 90 per cent of rated capacity.

Increases by Phoenix and Central raised steel's price composite on finished steel to \$127.41 a net ton, a 77-cent boost. The magazine's price composite on steelmaking scrap was raised to \$43.17 a gross ton, highest since August, 1953. The price a week ago was \$42.

## Wage Boost For Nickel Workers

**SUDBURY, Ont. (CP) —** A new wage contract giving 15,000 International Nickel company employees at Sudbury and Port Colborne pay increases of up to 11 cents an hour was signed Friday by Inco and the International Union of Mill and Smelter Workers (Ind.).

The 1955 contract, which the union says is the best ever negotiated with Inco, was signed in the company offices.

Under the contract the 15,000 hourly rated employees will be pensioned at 60 instead of at 65. Disabled employees may retire on pension earlier.

Union members also get a general wage increase of five per cent retroactive to July 1, when the old contract expired. Wages are raised 8½ to 11 cents an hour, bringing the basic rate to \$1.96½ from \$1.87.

## POLIO RATE UP

**LONDON (Reuters) —** Health authorities said Saturday the number of poliomyelitis cases in England and Wales so far this year already exceeds the 1954 total. In the last week, 164 cases have been reported, bringing the total this year to 733 of which 37 proved fatal. Through the whole of 1954, there were only 523 cases and 35 deaths.

## OTTAWA, (C.P.) —

Canada's exports now have increased to near-record proportions. The whole Canadian foreign trade picture has taken on a brighter glow in the wake of the Western world's economic recovery.

Exports in the first half of 1955 increased by almost \$200,000,000 to \$2,062,900,000 from \$1,860,000,000 in the first half of 1954. It is just slightly below the record of \$2,121,800,000 in the January-June period of 1952.

Imports also have increased, being by more than \$150,000,000 to \$2,097,000,000, up from \$2,050,100,000 in the first half of 1954 and against just slightly below the record of 1953.

**DEFICIT DECLINED** And amid this upsurge, Canada's deficit in foreign trade—that is, the excess of imports over exports—has declined to \$146,800,000 from \$178,800,000 a year ago.

What trends will develop in the second half of the year are not entirely clear but it appears certain now that 1955 will shape up as one of Canada's best foreign trade years.

One of the major questions marks is Britain. She has been buying heavily from Canada at a time when Canada's purchases from that country have declined.

Britain's deficit in Canadian trade has more than doubled in the first half of 1955 compared with the similar 1954 period.

Britain, fearing inflation, has points from 89 to 86. Distillers Seagram slipped ¼ to 39½ and Dome Mines was ¼ higher at 15½. Canadian Pacific and International Nickel were both down ¼, closing at 33½ and 77½ respectively.

Lake shore was ahead ¼ at 5½ on the American stock exchange as Giant Yellowknife advanced ¼ to 6¾. Royalite Oil was off ¼ at 14½.

deficit in trade with the U. S. Canada's deficit in American trade rose in the first half of the year to \$421,900,000 from \$358,000,000 in 1954. But in that period the surplus in trade with Britain more than doubled to \$202,700,000 from \$82,900,000 Canadian exports to the U. K. increased to \$386,400,000 from \$287,000,000 and imports dropped to \$183,700,000 from \$204,100,000.

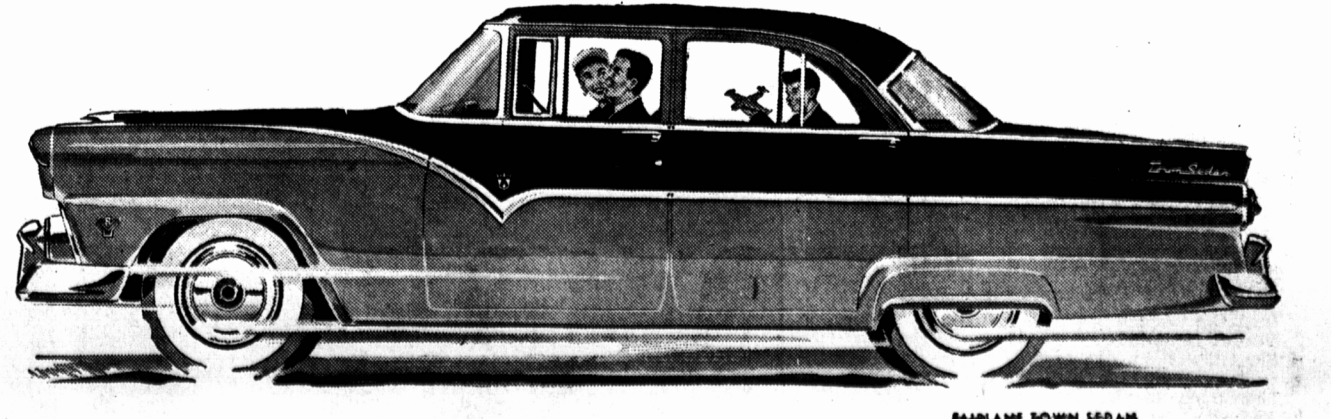
