

Says Indians Contribution To Canada Could Improve

MONTREAL (CP)—The Indian quest has faced the option of undergoing a much greater contribution to Canada, an eminent member of the race said Monday.

Dr. Gilbert C. Monture, now at Washington as a defence production ministry official, said Canada is a partial citizen who can advance only by rising above his background.

Dr. Monture was one of four speakers at a luncheon panel at which an Indian, French-Canadian, Anglo-Saxon and Jew outlined contributions of their cultures to Canada's development.

The panel was part of the 10th anniversary proceedings of the Canadian Council of Christian and Jews.

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The Jewish influence on Western life endures in spiritual and moral traditions, said Mr. Rosenberg, and Canada had made an interlational impact by "successfully encouraging the growth of multiple cultures."

LORE OF 20 CENTURIES

Like Canada itself, the Jewish community in Canada was multi-cultural and it had also been a political history drawn from 20 centuries of experience.

There was hardly any aspect of Canadian culture to which Jews had not made some contribution. Dr. Monture said that the pre-adoptive to the United Nations charter was in no way different to the pride of his own tribe which had promoted brotherhood and resisted aggression.

Monday, he said, the Indian had contributed doctors, lawyers, engineers, clergymen and priests. His misdeeds caught the honest pursuits, far more in abundance, tended to be ignored.

He was a ward of the government, subject to the experiences and realism of that government.

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BRANCHES ACROSS CANADA

R. C. M. P. Pamphlet Is Aid In Detecting Criminals

Early in December, merchant, service station operators, and business men in the Province will receive the latest pamphlet from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in the series entitled "Crime in Your Community."

This particular pamphlet has been constructed in the form of a chart that can be hung on a wall and deals exclusively with methods by which the general public may describe more effectively criminals they may encounter.

The front of the chart, by means of various sketches, deals with the common types of human facial appearance, with particular emphasis on the forehead, nose, ear, lips and chin.

All the back of the chart is listed a number of questions to observe in describing a possible offender, including apparent age, height, complexion, color of eyes and hair, distinctive

marks or tattoos, clothing and other adornments, speech, type of weapon, names overheard, and any other physical peculiarities.

On the card the Force advises the public, if questioned, to first notify the police and then answer the questions posed on the card, while the information is still fresh in your memory.

In addition the R. C. M. P. advise the victim of an offence to note the registration number of any vehicle apparently involved, and give it to the Police when you call.

The pamphlet warns the public to preserve anything a bandit may have touched, to keep foot or tyre prints intact, and to refrain from handling any object that may have been involved in the crime.
