Life Saving Class Tested At 'Pool'

A class in life saving and water safety went through its tests last night at the Charlottetown YMCA pool as it passed its first set of tests for life saving awards. The examiner was Mrs. Evelyn Cadmore, director water safety and first aid for the Red Cross.

Members of the junior class are Ian Hume, James Nicholson, James Webb, Betsy Swanson, Linda Clark and Sandra Rodd. Members of this class are between 14 and 18 years of age.

Members of the senior class, 17 years of age and over, are Roy Deixon, David Reynolds, Jean MacLain, Diane MacLain, Carol Cook, Elizabeth Hayward and Mrs. Jean Hodges.

The course which is six weeks long will have two periods a week, has David Mills as instructor. Included in the course are artificial respiration by the Holger-Nielsen and mouth-to-mouth method, self-defence in water, proper approach and rescue of drowning victims, necessary tests such as duck diving, floating for a minute, recovering heavy weights from depths of nine feet and 60 feet underwater swim.

The second part of the test, the endurance swim which includes climbing from street clothes in deep water and swimming 300 yards with three different strokes of 100 yards each, will be run off tonight at the "pool".

Mrs. Cadmore expressed her pleasure with the results of the tests so far by the two classes.

Four Bills Get 2nd Reading In Legislature Last Night

Second reading - approval in principle - was given in the Legislature to four bills last night. All were for amendments to existing acts.

An amendment to the Marriage Act inserts a clause in affidavit for applications for marriage licenses where the applicants are required to state that they believe there is no prior marriage mental incapacity or other lawful cause or legal impediment to bar or hinder the solemnization of the intended marriage.

Promoter of the bill, Attorney-General Melvin McQuaid pointed out that such a clause is a legal requirement and had been omitted when the act was drawn up.

A bill, promoted by Hon. J. David Stewart, minister responsible for civil defense in the province, will amend the Civil Defense and Disaster Act to omit a phrase in Section 6 which says the government has the power to enter into agreements respecting civil defence with the government of "any state of the United States or any North Atlantic Treaty Organization country."

Mr. McQuaid also promoted a bill to amend the Criminal Code of Canada as referred to in Section 7 of the Magistrates Act. It was only a minor change relating to a re-numbering of a chapter of the Criminal Code of Canada as referred to in Section 7 of the Magistrates Act.

Mr. Stewart pointed out that "this Legislature cannot pass legislation enabling the province to enter into an agreement with another country. It's completely unconstitutional."
