

S.D.U. Basketball Team In 84-42 Victory Over St. Thomas University

The powerful Saint Dunstan's University basketball team won their fourteenth straight victory here Saturday night by trouncing Saint Thomas University 84-42 in a N.B. - P.E.I. Intercollegiate League game.

The game was played at the I.D.U. Gym where the Saints have won their last 22 games.

The Saints' great court ace, Jack Leonard, led the scoring parade by adding up 42 points, Jack tossed in 8 field goals and four free throws to give his greatest Intercollegiate evening display.

Reardon has scored 114 points in the three Intercollegiate games the Saints have played this year for an average of 38 points a game.

Joe Mullally with 11 points was runner-up to Reardon. Pete Dunphy and Johnny Taylor each scored 10.

O'Brien with 14 points was high scorer for the Tommies. Stephen was runner-up with 12 points and McMullen third with 11.

The Saints led the Intercollegiate League with three wins in three starts. Mount Allison University is in second place with three wins against one loss.

The Saints raced into a commanding 49-9 lead in the first half of their game with the Tommies. At the end of the first quarter they were leading 22-4 and at the three-quarter mark the local Collegians were ahead by a 72-20 count.

The visitors rallied in the fourth quarter to outscore the Saints 22-12.

Pete Dunphy led in percentage shooting with four baskets in four tries for a perfect 100. The Saints team scored 37 baskets out of 100 tries for a percentage of 36.5.

In the free throw department the Saints made 10 out of 20 while the visitors made six out of 17.

HALIFAX, (CP)—Hughie Campbell's second goal of the game led Halifax Atlantics to a 4-3 victory over Sydney Millionaires in a Maritime Major Hockey League encounter here Saturday night.

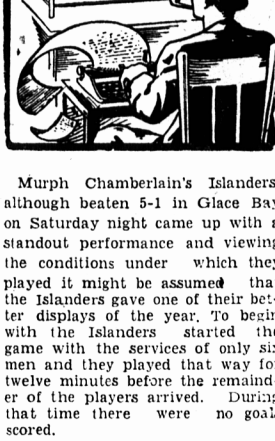

Murph Chamberlain's Islanders, Although Beaten 5-1 In Glace Bay On Saturday Night Came Up With A Standout Performance And Viewing The Conditions Under Which They Played It Might Be Assumed That The Islanders Gave One Of Their Better Displays Of The Year To Begin With The Islanders Started The Game With The Services Of Six Men And They Played That Way For Twelve Minutes Before The Remainder Of THE PLAYERS ARRIVED. DURING THAT TIME THERE WERE NO GOALS SCORED.

The Islanders travelled to Glace Bay in four cars Saturday. They left here around 7:30 in the morning and despite the fairly heavy going the first two cars reached the Bay before game time. A stalled car on an icy Cape Breton hill blocked the progress of the remaining two cars. In the two cars which arrived at Glace Bay before game-time there were seven players, but one of them Walter Pawlshyn had his skates in another car. Of the six players ready to play there was goalie Al Millar, defencemen George McLagan and Steve Brklacich and forwards Hub Beaudry, Marcel Clements and Lyle Wiseman.

They were a meagre looking lineup as they skated onto the ice for their pre-game practice. However it is a credit to them that they played for twelve minutes before replacements arrived and in that time there wasn't a goal scored. And during that time they played a man short for two minutes. Twelve minutes is a long stretch in M. M. H. hockey especially in the big Glace Bay rink where the Miners forwards toss the puck around with deadly accuracy.

But the rough part was still to come. Shortly after the start of the third period goalie Al Millar was hit by a deflected puck on the cheek bone and knocked senseless. Al had to be replaced by Gus Gustavson which meant that the Islanders had two defencemen for the remainder of the game. This left only George McLagan and Brklacich to carry the defensive load. However, it is likely that Wiseman was moved back for some blinding but, but even at that McLagan and Brklacich had a long night's work.

Tonight Gustavson will likely be back in the nets. Millar, despite his facial injury, is willing enough to play but it is extremely doubtful if Al will be able to don the pads. He certainly won't if his cheek bone is fractured as he was told in Glace Bay. Such an injury will keep him out for three weeks or more so Murph Chamberlain will be looking for a substitute goalie. It will hardly be Gelineau. He had been playing steady for the Aces of late and turning in top notch games.

Chamberlain has plenty of problems facing him at the moment. Three of his regulars are on the side lines with injuries or sickness. Right winger Bob Gray still has his wrist in a cast and although he may be playing with the cast on, he won't be in action for at least another ten days. Hob is skating regularly but has trouble handling a stick.

Chuck Holdaway is recovering in the Prince Edward Island Hospital following a tonsillectomy but while Chuck's tonsil trouble has been removed his stomach has been acting up and as a result he is on a third stage ulcer diet. It is not certain that Chuck has an ulcer and x-rays are to be taken to determine what is the matter with his stomach. Chuck himself hopes to be back playing in a little over a week.

Eddy Shore, the coach and owner of the Syracuse Chiefs of the American Hockey League is attempting to have centreman Teddy Powers recalled. Shore notified the Islanders Club Saturday that he wanted Powers in Syracuse this week or else the smooth playing centre would be suspended. Powers does not wish to report to Syracuse and was supposed to talk with Shore yesterday from Glace Bay. Neither Powers nor Murph Chamberlain caught the last crossing of the boat at Borden last night so the exact standing of the player is not known.

Glace Bay Miners Whip Islanders 5-1; Millar Injured In 3rd Period

GLACE BAY, N.S. (CP)—Glace Bay Miners put on an exhibition of speed and scoring power to whip Charlottetown Islanders 5-1 in a free-wheeling Maritime Major Hockey League game here Saturday night before 2,400 fans.

Al Miller, who turned in a sensational performance in the Charlottetown nets, was hurt in a pile-up around the cage early in the third period. Gus Gustavson became the Islanders' second substitute goalie of the week and turned in some flashy stops, but by that time the Miners had the game on ice.

The loss gave Islanders a setback in their race against the league-leading Halifax Atlantics and increased Glace Bay's margin over the last-place Sydney Millionaires.

Miller took his worst pounding in the second period, turning aside 23 of the game's 53 stops. Don Lockhart kicked out 29 Charlottetown scoring efforts after Wally Pawlshyn spoiled his chances of a shutout late in the first period, deadlocking the score.

The Miners shot two in the second and two in the third. Bill McCracken notched a pair and other goals came from Eddie Joss, Pop Backer and Connie Bonhomme.

Miller arrived home about eight o'clock last night with a badly swollen left cheek bone. He will have x-rays taken this morning to determine the extent of the injury. A Glace Bay physician examined the injury Saturday night and expressed the belief that the bone was broken.

However Miller is willing to play tonight if Club officials will allow him. He stated last night that his vision, which was blurred after he was struck by the puck, had cleared yesterday and that he was ready to go back into the nets.

The puck struck Miller on the cheek bone after it had glanced off the stick of his ex-teammate Connie Bonhomme. The force of the blow knocked Miller out.

Gus Gustavson was used as a replacement for the remainder of the game.

Sydney Millionaires To Play Here Tonight

Johnny Horeck of the Sydney Millionaires, who has been beaten by one goal so many times this season that he has to think about the matter, leads his Sydney Millionaires into Charlottetown today for a game with the Islanders.

The Horeckmen, who produced what was probably the finest game of the season on their last trip here, have been playing regular tonight. Goalie Al Millar stated last night he was willing to play but if Al's cheek bone injury is as serious as it looks Millar will hardly be in the cage.

This will be the third time that the Islanders have met the Millionaires without their regular goalie. Last week when the teams met twice Millar was on the suspended list for an offense of which he was later cleared.

Islanders coach Murph Chamberlain had not arrived home at the time of writing this morning so it is not known what the Hard-rock has in mind for tonight.

Powers May Be Recalled

The Syracuse Chiefs of the American Hockey League are attempting to have the Islanders' Teddy Powers recalled. It was learned here over the week-end.

The goal against Chicago Black Hawks Sunday night was Howe's 41st of the season.

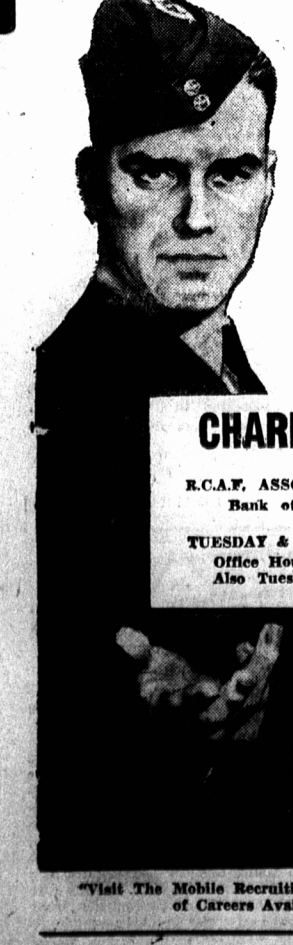
Detroit Red Wings Defeat Chicago 4-1
