

Girls Have Better Chance Of Living To An Old Age

TORONTO (CP)—Girls have a better chance than boys of reaching adulthood and will probably live longer, an Ontario health department study of causes of death in the province during a five-year period shows.

A study based on recorded deaths for the years 1950-1954 inclusive more than 12 months in the making, analyzes the deaths by age, sex and cause.

Its statistics are based on an international system of classifying causes of death adopted in 1950 to try to do away with national differences.

HEART, CANCER FIRST
The study shows an average of 44,418 deaths a year during the study period. It shows heart disease and cancer are the major killers, with 36.9 per cent and 14.9 per cent of the deaths respectively.

Vascular lesion of the central nervous system was the third largest cause of death with 13.2 per cent. Then came accidental causes, 6.4 per cent; and pneumonia, bronchitis and influenza, 4.2 per cent.

Balancing the deaths down by sex and age, the report says that more males die in every age group up to the age of 75. Up to the age of 35, accidents were the largest single cause of death, then heart diseases.

It also indicates that the safest and healthiest period of life is from 15 to 19 years. The average annual death toll for this group was only 288, with accidents killing more than 50 per cent of them.

In the 15-to-30 year group, accidents took a much heavier toll of males than females, the ratio being about 4.5 to one.

Suicide was the No. 3 killer in the 30-34 year group, running almost five per cent of the total average annual number of deaths.

In the 35-to-54 year group, suicides accounted for one-quarter of the accidental deaths. Motor vehicle accidents were the largest accidental killer.

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Vice-Admiral Harry DeWolf, chief of the Canadian naval staff, drew attention to the battle honors won by former (British) ships of the same name and which the new Bonaventure will bear. He said:

PLACE TO MANKIND
