Britain must sell Canada more to buy more.
"Increasing these exports is our responsibility. We must find what you need. Our prices and deliveries must be competitive."

Britain was determined to live within her means even though it "will mean hard work and, maybe, painful restraints upon our way of life."

Martin made the suggestion for a neutral commission Nov. 3 and both he and Assemblyman L. B. Pearson, Canada's External Affairs Minister, have had numerous talks with Krishna Menon, deputy leader of the Indian delegation. Menon is slated to speak Wednesday before the assembly's political committee. Meanwhile, Acheson left today with a copy of the resolution to take up his scheduled conference tomorrow in Washington with President Truman and President-elect Eisenhower. Indian delegates said previously they would not submit a proposal unless they had some indication from the Chinese Communists that their plan would have a chance for success. Diplomatic sources said the Indians received "encouraging" information from their embassy at Peking.

Backs U. N. View
The proposal backs the UN, command's insistence that force not be used to send back into Communist hands any prisoner genuinely fearing re-education. It also emphasizes that no prisoners should be held by force. The Communists charge that prisoners are being forcibly detained by the UN command. The Communists have argued that all prisoners must be repatriated. Of 121,000 Chinese and 70,000 Korean prisoners in UN hands, 70,000 have said they do not wish to be repatriated and 12,000 of the latter—believed to be the hard core of the problem—are Chinese. Some Western diplomats believe this number would dwindle in another screening under a neutral commission where the prisoners were face-to-face with the opportunity to return home.

Second Death In Automobile Accident
TORONTO, Nov. 17 —(CP)— Emma Lemesurier, 53, of Toronto died today of injuries suffered in an automobile accident north of here Saturday, the second death in the crash.
The Ralph Munro of Camp Borden and formerly of Saint John, N. B., alleged driver of the car died before reaching hospital. Two others, Ptes. R. J. Steel and Joseph Groulx, both of Camp Borden, were injured.

Police said the car plunged down a nine foot bank from the highway, smashed a telephone pole, bounced off one tree and climbed dirt way up another.

HALIFAX, Nov. 17 —(CP)— The H.M.S. Rocket, a fleet destroyer converted to a sleek anti-submarine frigate is in port here showing the Canadian navy a completed version of the 14 ships Canada has under construction.

Cmdr. T. F. Halifax, commander of the British craft, said the Canadian ships will be constructed differently from their visiting cousin, but will basically be designed for the same purpose—anti-submarine.

At a press conference on board the Rocket, Cmdr. Halifax said the ship is the first to feature "under deck" fighting. He said when the ship goes to battle, all personnel are beneath the deck operating with newly-designed instruments.

"During exercises at Key West, Florida, I seldom saw the ship leaving port before sun-up, operating in my black box all day and returning after sun-down."

It was intimated that although the ship is a powerhouse against submarines she is weak against another surface ship.

The 1700-ton frigate carries 200 officers and men.

Two Horses Killed On Road; Car Damaged

Two horses belonging to Mr. Ralph McInnis were killed near the owners driveway at Seas Cow Pond near Tignish early Sunday morning when struck by a 1952 Meteor taxi driven by Nelson Gaudet of Tignish. The horses apparently jumped from the side of the road directly in front of the taxi, one being killed instantly. The driver was not injured and Jerome Martin, the only passenger in the taxi, received face cuts and bruises. Damage to the vehicle was estimated at over six hundred dollars.—S

S'side Bank Vault Door Is Repaired

A defect which occurred on Saturday morning in the lock mechanism of the vault door of the Canadian Bank of Commerce in Summerside, was repaired for business yesterday after fifteen hours work by an expert who was brought in here from Halifax. All records and cash were temporarily inaccessible to the bank staff who worked Saturday morning without the benefit of these two important banking items. This door, which is about two years old, is both theft and fire proof.—S

S'side Meeting Will Discuss High School

The Summerside Board of School Trustees announced yesterday that a meeting will be held at the Summerside High School library on Friday evening for a preliminary discussion of the matter of a regional high school for the Kensington, Summerside, Borden areas. It is not intended that this will be an official meeting. Delegates will enter into discussion which will be of a purely exploratory nature, regarding such matters as financing and maintenance, and will report back to their respective school boards. It has been pointed out by educationists in this part of the Province that the only solution to the educational problems is the establishment of a regional high school accommodating grades eight to twelve. They have stated that the solution would give those students a complete high school education within travelling distance of their homes and would provide them also with a more varied type of education such as is possible only in a large school plant. Dr. L. W. Shaw, deputy minister of education will be present at the meeting on Friday. Dr. G. E. Bennett, principal of the regional high school at Port Elgin, N. B., who had been scheduled to be present to address the meeting will not be able to attend due to previous commitments.—S

Arrangements for a Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic for which use of the hall was given free. Every boy and girl who took the tests at the close of the Swimming and Water Safety Course passed. Much credit is due the instructor, Miss Irene Buote of Tignish. Arrangements for the course were made by citizens assisted by providing transportation and beach supervision.

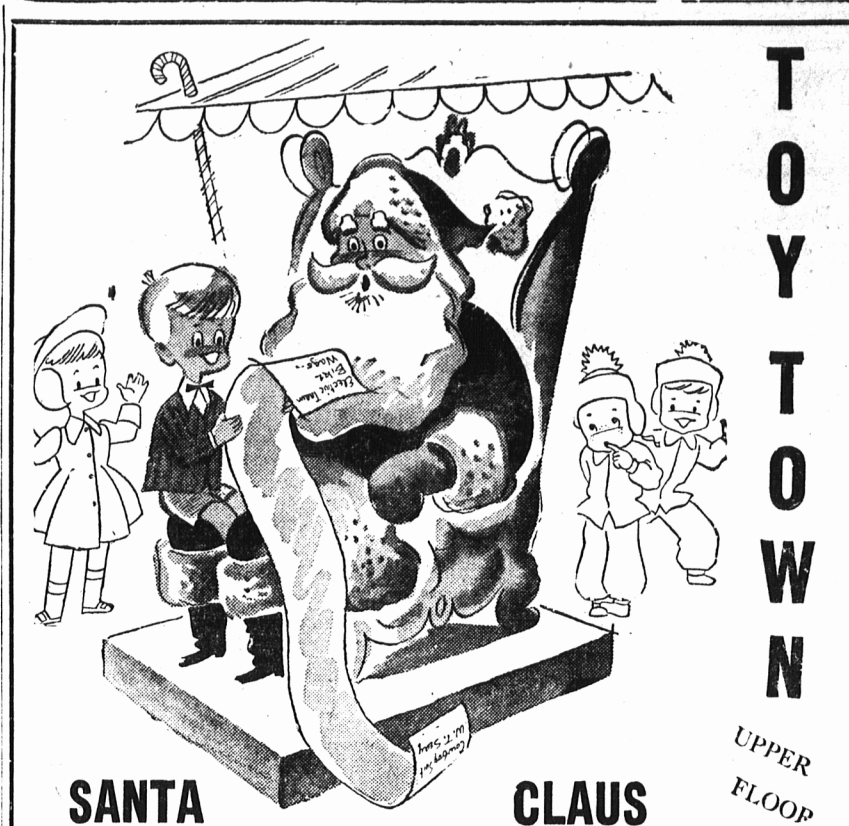
During the year the W. I. Hall and cellar were thoroughly cleaned and some renovations made. The projection room was removed and several new records were purchased.
