## Cascumpec Farmer Wins Prince Co. Plowing Title

O'LEARY — A Cascumpec farmer, Arthur Hudson, won the senior plowing title yesterday at the annual Prince County Plowing Match in O'Leary.

Murray Ellis of West Cape, the new junior champion also received firsts for best crown and best finish.

Competition was considerably tougher and entries almost doubled over last year's match and the improvement in the quality of the plowing was termed terrific by Judges Stanley Willis and Elliot Rogers.

Held on the farm of Therin Ellis, the events were largely attended in spite of cloudy skies and intermittent showers during the afternoon. Darkness had set in by the time the final results of the judges were completed.

Achievement day for the O'Leary 4H Club was held in the afternoon and the children took part in a number of racing events.

The match was officially opened by the deputy minister of agriculture, S.C. Wright, who said that good farming starts with good plowing. Mr. Wright complimented the club members on the quality of their calves and urged more young ladies to compete in the plowing matches.

Brief remarks were made by Dr. George Dewar, Allison Profit, who judged the calves, and J.W. Don Campbell.

The president of the match, Raynall MacNeill welcomed the audience and introduced the speakers.

## Pensioner Tells S'ide Court Liquor Cheaper Than Doctor

SUMMERSIDE — Judge J.S. DesRoches was slightly taken aback yesterday by the reply he received from an 83-year-old Alberton man charged with possessing liquor other than in his residence.

The judge told the elderly man he couldn't afford a \$50 fine while living on the Old Age Pension.

The elderly pensioner replied that he took the whiskey for medicine and found it much cheaper than doctor's bills. He was still fined \$20 and costs.

In other cases on the docket, a further remand was given Wendell William Larkin of Charlottetown when he appeared in magistrate's court. Larkin is charged with breaking into two stores at Kensington on Aug. 30. He was remanded until Sept. 15th for

trial.

IMPAIRED DRIVERS  
Wendell Mann, Kensington, pleaded to a charge of driving a motor vehicle while impaired from driving a reduced charge from driving while intoxicated. Judge DesRoches told the accused he didn't want to fine him too heavily but he wanted to make sure the accused realized the seriousness of the offence and to teach him a lesson.

The judge stated \$100 to a rich man is nothing but a \$50 fine to a poor man is a hardship. He was fined \$50 and costs.

George Bennett, Alberton was fined \$100 and costs for driving a motor vehicle while impaired which was also reduced from the more serious charge of driving while intoxicated. However the accused had nothing to say in his own behalf when asked by Judge DesRoches and the normal fine of \$100 was imposed.

Mr. MacLean left the capital with Prime Minister Diefenbaker's party en route to Chicago and then continued on to the west coast. He had arrived back in Ottawa from Charlottetown at 5 p.m. Wednesday and left again Thursday at 8 a.m.

In Vancouver Mr. MacLean will open a new technology laboratory for the fisheries research board of the department of fisheries.

The following days he will attend meetings of the board West Coast advisory committee and then tour British Columbia to inspect departmental fishing stations.

Mr. MacLean will be back in Ottawa September 9.

## S'ide Board Of Trade Urges Improvements

### SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN

Members of the Summerside Board of Trade held their September meeting at the Civic Building and were shown the complexities of civic administration accounting by Town Manager Joe Brophy.

At the business meeting preceding the tour of the town of office, president A.H. Hubley presided.

Paving of the remaining unpaved portion of the Sherbrooke Road was advocated by the board members, along with the unpaved portion of Harvard Street east within Summerside, with the view that paving of these roads would lessen traffic, especially truck traffic, on Water Street.

Strong criticism was made by board members against the practice of motorists flocking to the Summerside fire hall whenever a fire alarm is sounded.

They discussed the traffic congestion that develops in this area, hindering firemen from getting to the fire hall, and getting in the way of fire engines departing for the location of the fire.

### PENALTIES NEEDED

It was reported that these cars also raced to the fire ahead and behind the fire trucks, and the situation has worsened to a point where it was felt that heavy penalties in court should be imposed to compel motorists to remain out of the way of fire-fighting trucks during fire alarms.

Reporting for the industrial development committee, John S. Wright said that George Melkie deserved the congratulations of the board on his initiative in constructing a modern new building that will add to the industrial life of the town.

Appreciation was directed to the federal member of Parliament for Prince County, Dr. O. H. Phillips, in regard to the construction of a produce inspection shed being built on the marine wharf. Board members felt that the shed would prove beneficial to agricultural interests.

The members felt that consideration might be made for the installation of refrigeration in the new shed at a later time to provide for the development and expansion of the growing northern shipping markets.

### Dredging of the harbour was suggested as being necessary following reports of the 167th

John Wright, P.E.I. vice-president of APEC, reported that the general meeting of P. E. I. members of APEC will be held in Charlottetown next Wednesday evening, September 9, prior to the annual meeting for the Maritimes, at Fredericton, N. B., on Sept. 14-15.

He reported that the development of business by water to the north has been so successful that the steamship company is prepared to continue the service. He said that every trip on the ship has given them a bigger cargo, and P.E.I. should get busy getting orders in the northern market because the ship is prepared to call at island ports any time there is a worthwhile cargo.

Roy Johnston, chairman of the Summerside Lobster Carnival, said the central committee expected to hold its final meeting Thursday night.

Recalling the excellent weather enjoyed by the province during lobster carnival week, he expressed appreciation of the cooperation enjoyed from all the people involved in carnival work and preparations.

By keeping this magic word in mind, the police hope, motorists and other road-users will help to make this Labor Day weekend a truly happy one, even for police officers on duty.
