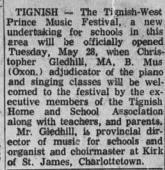

Aberton RHS Votes To Drop Final Exams

ALBERTON — The third annual meeting of Aberton District Regional High School was held Tuesday evening with John R. Rochford, chairman of the board of trustees, presiding. In his annual report the chairman noted that all six students who went from last year's grade 11 successfully passed their examinations in college and university.

MR. GLEHILL
 Born in Borden, Kent, England, the son of a clergyman, he could hum 15 tunes before he learned to speak. He attended Marlborough College, later the Royal College of Music, London, England and entered Oriel College, Oxford, as an organ scholar. Mr. Glehill obtained the degrees of M.A. and B. Mus. and held various musical posts and travelled in Europe until 1958.

He served in France and Madagascar as a lieutenant and adjutant during the Second World War.

He came to Canada in 1948 as organist and choirmaster in a 4th borough and Lanarkshire, Ontario; also in Montreal, where he gave several organ and piano recitals. He has appeared on radio and T.V. as performer, conductor and panel member, written and composed music for the three village schools, and Sister St. Rosalia, superior of Notre Dame convent, Paris, who has seen the great need to promote this work here. CHORAL READING
 On Saturday, May 25, the choral reading will be adjudicated by Rev. Sister St. Charity, superior of Missouche convent for the French selection. She has had a wide experience as a drama director and a teacher of diction.

The adjudicator of the English selection will be Rev. Sister St. Ignatius, of the staff of St. Maria School, North Rustico, who has been very successful with choral reading groups in previous festivals.

Besides the Tignish schools, there are also three of the rural schools taking part. These are Anglo-Tignish, Tignish Shore and Norway.

Altogether upwards of 500 pupils will be participating. A cordial invitation is extended to the public to attend this festival which will be looked forward to with much enthusiasm by those in charge.
