TOKYO, April 13 (AP)—Thousands fled tonight as fire roared through Atami, a seaside resort 65 miles southwest of Tokyo.

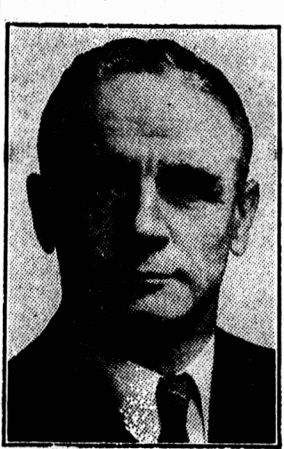
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Brackens Here Looking Over P.E.I. Livestock

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Farm Prices And Markets

The following information on farm market prices was contained in the weekly review issued by the Provincial Department of Agriculture:

The following is the detail on potato prices at the present moment:

O'Leary: Seed—55c per bus. at the car. Tablestock—55c per bus. at the warehouse with a fair movement.

Wellington: Seed—Cobblers 70c per bus. at the car. No movement. Tablestock—52c per bus. at the car.

Summerside: Seed—Cobblers 70c per bus. Small Sebagoes 60c. No Mountains or Katahdins. Tablestock—52c per bus. with a slow movement. Moving only out of warehouses.

Borden Line: Seed—Cobblers 80c per bus. Katahdins 64c per bus. at the car. Tablestock—48c per bus. Heavy movement before storm.

Charlottetown: Seed—Cobblers 75c per bus. Sebagoes, Mountains, and Katahdins 54c per bus. at the car. Tablestock—52c per bus. with a slower movement. Turnips 1.00 per bus. for best quality.

Vernon River—Only small quantities moving of both seed and tablestock. Roads blocked. Prices indefinite.

Cardigan: Seed—55c per bus. at the car. Tablestock—52c per bus. Morell: Seed—Sebagoes and Katahdins No. 1 55c per bus. Cobblers 50c at the car. No. 2 Katahdins 70c. Tablestock—None moving. Lots of cars but bad roads.

Elmira: Seed—Foundation A Katahdins No. 1's 58c per bus. No. 1 small 70c. Cobblers 75c per bus. Peepees 70c. Steady and heavy movement. No tablestock moving.

Kensington: Seed—Slow movement 48c-51c per bus. Tablestock light movement. It will be observed from the above quotations that the market is definitely easier.

Turnip markets, as expected, have deteriorated. The quality is not high and there are quite a few carloads on track.

There are still some complaints coming through regarding the poor quality of hay being shipped from the Province. As already intimated, hay should not go forward until it is definitely cleared regarding the grade. Prices are still maintained around \$18.00 to \$17.00 per ton.

Among The Farmers Federation Of Agriculture News

A Feature For Every Friday Results Of Vote

In another part of this paper appears the results of the marketing vote recently conducted by the Federation. The final results of the vote were delayed for a couple of weeks because some of the districts asked for an extension of time to collect the ballots from those farmers who were unable to attend the district meetings.

Dairy Problems On March 20th, the Canadian Federation and the Dairy Farmers of Canada presented a Brief to the Finance Department at Ottawa analyzing the trend of the dairy situation and asking that certain tariffs and duties on dairy equip-

ment be adjusted. Some of the articles asked to be freed of these duties are milk cans, wire for baling feed, auxiliary motors, milk filters, coolers, cream separators, milk machines, farm wagons and sleighs, electric fencing apparatus, barbed and woven wire, etc. The reasons for such a request is because dairy farmers are being asked to reduce their costs of production.

In 1948 the Dominion Bureau of Statistics estimated the cash income from dairy products was \$380 million. This income was down approximately \$40 million, or over 10 per cent in 1949. Processed feed prices, one of the important factors in costs of dairy production increased at least 10 per cent.

unfactured which increased each week until April 1st when the production was 45,144 lbs. It, therefore, will not be long before our production will meet consumer requirements in the province and producers will be on the export basis again.

Parkdale and Spring Park, the two urban schools in the unit, have modernized school buildings. It is expected, however that new school buildings will be built in Central Royalty, East Royalty and at Winsloe Station in time for use this fall. The building at West Royalty may be remodelled.

The grand based on the ratio of fifty cents per capita for the area will result in a decrease of about twelve percent in taxation rates for the districts of West Royalty, Central Royalty, East Royalty and Central Winsloe.

The new schools in the three districts will closely resemble the school built last year at Southport. They will be equipped with Clerestory lighting but will probably have a different roof design. This type of building is so designed that additional units of one room or more may be added at any time without altering the general architecture.

Production is increasing fairly rapidly in the southern and western areas of New Brunswick and very soon some creameries will be able to supply the current demand in their respective areas in that province.

The price of butter on the Charlottetown market has not changed within the past week and as long as the price is maintained at the officially reported levels in the provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, there is not likely to be much change in the Charlottetown price. Wholesale price of one and two pound prints on the Charlottetown market at present is 62c delivered with Local Jobbing 63c.

We are not past the lowest point of production in our province. For the week ending March 11th, there were 38,980 pounds of butter mar-
