

Ch'town's Legion Juniors Snatch Commanding Lead

The Charlottetown Canadian Legion junior baseball aggregation took a commanding 2-0 lead in their best-of-seven series with Summerside Junior Legionnaires, for the Island junior baseball championship over the weekend.

The Charlottetown Legion team, handled by Charles Ryan, build up a 6-0 lead in Summerside Saturday, behind the pitching arm of Morell's Mike Kelly to coast to an easy 6-1 decision in the opening battle. Billy Weatherbie was on the mound Sunday to lead Charlottetown to a 2-1 decision at Memorial Field.

In Saturday's game Kelly went the route for the Ryan coached squad and sent 12 batters down via the strike-out route in picking up the win. Wayne MacDougall paced the winners attack at the plate Saturday. He belted three hits in four appearances at the plate. Billy Weatherbie connected for two hits in four trips to the batter's box to aid the winner's cause.

Paul MacWilliams toed the slab for Summerside Saturday with Downe coming in to relieve in the seventh inning. The longest hit for the Charlottetown team came off the diminutive Walter Bradley who performs at second base. In the opening battle, the capital city squad picked up nine hits while Kelly limited the Summerside swingers to four hits.

Summerside with Henry Pius' Gallant at the helm garnered six hits in Sunday's encounter, while the Ryan coached Squad connected for nine baseknocks.
