Centennial Blossom Tea

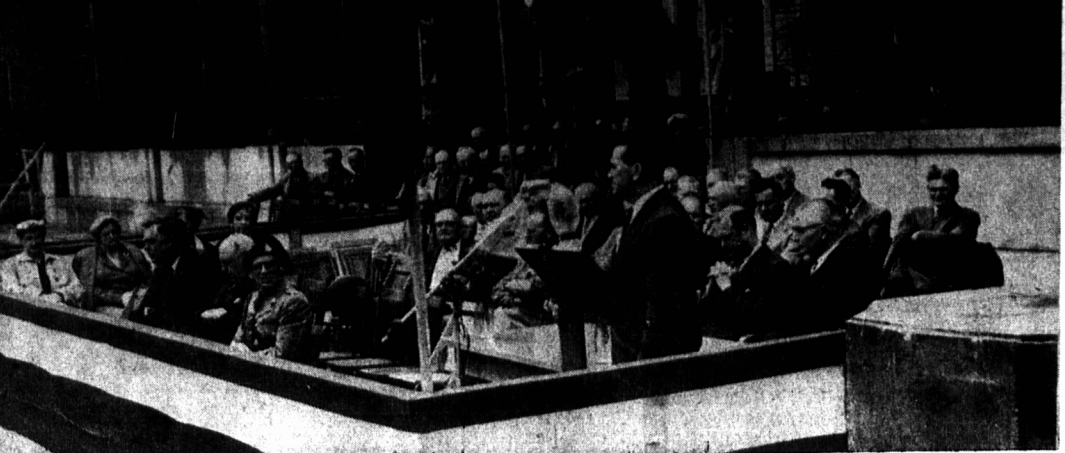

Seamen Strikers Seek To Tie Up Liner Queen Mary

LONDON (AP)—Leaders of a wildcat seamen's strike worked feverishly a long Southampton's waterfront Wednesday night to bring out the Queen Mary's crew even as passengers began filing up the gangway of the giant liner. They were having some success—just how much was difficult to tell. But there was no sign that the strikers would be able to prevent the sailing of the 81,000-ton Cunarder for New York late Wednesday night.

While that meeting was in progress at 10 Downing Street, the prime minister's official residence, it was announced that the cabinet would convene this morning for a review of the situation. Earlier, Eden was received in audience by the Queen at Windsor castle and discussed prospects for ending the state of emergency proclaimed two weeks ago at the height of the rail strike.

The strikes have crippled British air and sea transport, and have cut the Queen Mary's earning capacity. The Queen Mary herself, pride of the merchant fleet, is one of Britain's big dollar earners.

Eden conferred late Wednesday with members of the general council of the Trades Union Congress, the giant union federation that also is seeking to end the walkouts.
