He went back to the halls of learning in 1952 to attend the Institute of International Air Law, devoted to the research and development of laws applying to the air, at McGill. He worked on his thesis, while doing a full time air force job, following his year at the University and it was accepted last fall. Thus a former fighter pilot and now "the air force's" authority on international air law has gone to battle again - this time with words instead of Spitfires - for control of the skies.'

Regardless of the type, marketing Boards are looked upon as an agency to bring about greater efficiency in marketing, to increase the farmer's share of the consumer's dollar and to provide reliable information on the actual market. While farmers will agree that these are desirable objectives not all agree that marketing boards can provide them. Nevertheless, the trend appears to be for more and more producers to place their faith in some type of bargaining agency over which they themselves exercise control.
