Serious Economic Difficulty Is Story Of Conditions In Iraq

Editor's note: Associated Press correspondent Stan Carter has just returned to Rome after 3½ months in Iraq. In the following story he reports on the economic situation in that Middle East country.

ROME (AP) — Iraq is in serious economic difficulty. A private economist estimates national production has dropped 40 per cent since last July's revolution. Wages have increased 80 per cent.

Iraqi officials deny the economist's figures, but they jibe with the observation of foreigners in the country and with the few statistics that are available. It is known that consumption of petroleum products — a good indicator of the state of the mechanized segment of the economy — is currently 25,000 barrels a day compared to 30,000 last summer. Under normal conditions of economic growth petroleum consumption could have been expected to increase this year to 35,000 barrels daily.

Iraqis are beginning to ask why the cost of living is going up.

HIT BY STRIKES
The country's few industries have been plagued by strikes and other disturbances. The individual worker thinks he has never had it so good. For the first time in his life he belongs to a labor union. If he doesn't like a boss he can complain to the union — and frequently get the boss dismissed. The union is dominated by the Communists, whom the worker holds in high regard. His pay is higher, and under the labor law enacted by the revolutionary regime he cannot be fired.

Iraq has basically an agrarian economy, with an addition of oil revenues. There are fewer than 50,000 industrial workers compared to 2,000,000 agricultural workers.

LAND CONFISCATED
Agricultural land is being confiscated from the big land owners to be redistributed to the agricultural workers under the agrarian reform law passed last fall. Most agricultural workers seem to think the land will be a gift from the government, although the law provides for them to pay for it over a 20-year period.

Even before the July, 1958 revolution that destroyed Iraq's pro-Western monarchy, Iraq had a sort of modified state socialism, with most of the industry owned by the government — and most of it losing money. With a 550,000,000-ruble loan received from Russia, the Iraqis
