12 Jockeys Named To Racing Hall Of Fame

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y. (AP)—Earl Sande, rider of three Kentucky Derby winners, and 11 other jockeys were named to racing's hall of fame Wednesday by the organization's executive committee.

Six trainers also were honored as were 10 horses, all of whom raced prior to 1900.

The selections were announced by Walter M. Jeffords, president of the National Museum of Racing. Names of the nominees will be formally enshrined in the new hall of fame building next August.

Quebecer To Attempt Swim Of Lake Ontario

TORONTO (CP)—Lorenzo Lamontagne, 34, a Quebec Hydro Electric Power Commission line worker from Sherbrooke, Que., started training here Wednesday for the Canadian National Exhibition's Lake Ontario swim Sept. 9.

His hometown financed his participation in the 32-mile race after he swam 34 miles in Lake Memphramagog in 2 1/2 hours, July 9—his first attempt at long-distance swimming.

The husky five-foot-six-inch swimmer recently churned through 15 miles of 50-degree water to timber up for his attempt here.

Lamontagne said he expects a large group from Sherbrooke to cheer him on his attempt, including his four sisters and three brothers. However, his wife and "she can't stand to watch," said Lamontagne. "Likely she will sit by the radio and pray."

Yankees Prescribe T.V. Ban As Attendance Cure

NEW YORK (AP)—New York Yankees have proposed to the Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers that the three clubs enter into an agreement next year not to televise night games. The World-Telegram and The Sun says.

Dan Daniel, writing for the newspaper, says the move is aimed at curbing slumping attendance at New York baseball parks.

He says George Weiss, general manager of the Yankees, will confer with Horace Stoneham, president of the Giants, next week. Walter O'Malley, president of the Dodgers, will confer with Stoneham later.

Brooklyn is not expected to enter into the agreement but the Giants may react favorably to the proposal, the writer adds.

The Yankees have drawn 1,145,000 to 63 stadium games this year for the best attendance among local clubs but the team's owners are reported dissatisfied with the figures.

The Giants, with a disappointing club, are almost certain to finish in the red while the Dodgers are running behind last year's attendance.

132 Golfers Tee Off In \$26,000 Open Today In Canada's Richest Tourney

By JACK SULLIVAN Canadian Press Staff Writer MONTREAL (CP)—Arnold Palmer feels he hasn't lost his magic touch, which could lead to his being the field of 132 golfers which tees off today in the \$26,000 Or Canada's richest tournament.

But no one is blasé enough to concede the newly-crowned Canadian Open champion the \$5,000 first prize or even a sizable chunk of the big payoff.

He has stiff opposition, the stiffest to appear in Canada this year. "I'd say my game is still pretty good," the 25-year-old rookie pro from Latrobe, Pa., said after practice round Wednesday on the flat, creek-studded course in preparation for the four-day, 72-hole tournament.

His game, incidentally, was enough to give him last week's open at Weston, Ont., with a brilliant 23-under-par 265, the second lowest score in the 46-year history of the championship.

Palmer had a wee bit of trouble. "The cutter" that helped him considerably in his terrific Canadian Open tour is missing. "I noticed it was gone when I checked my bag here," he said.

He was not too unhappy about it but admitted the club was a big factor in last week's victory, his first pro triumph in his career.

Included in the starting list are two "world" champions—black-haired Julius Boros, the reigning

and 1953 winner of the title at Chicago's T. M. O'Shaner.

Boros pocketed \$50,000 and contract calling for \$55,000 in exhibition matches for his triumph. This is his first tournament since he big day three weeks ago. The 1955 money-winning list with \$6,000, mostly from his "world" triumph, wasn't around for last week's Canadian Open.

Inclusion of these two is enough to make this championship a real test for anybody. Then there's "Doug Ford, the current U. S. Professional Golfers' Association champion, who had his first major win in this Open's inaugural two years ago, and Bud Holscher, the west-coasting Californian here to defend his 1954 title.

The pros went out in full strength to test the course Wednesday, and although the layout is par 70, not one predicted the winner would match Ford's winning score of 15-under-par 265 in 1953.

All agreed that anyone carrying 68 or 270 would mount the winner's stand late Sunday afternoon. The majority of players who competed in the Canadian Open here, with these additions, apart from Boros and Tompkins, Frank Stranahan, Chandler, Harry Jimmy Demaree and "Willie" Jack Burke, runner-up in the Canadian Open, reported here Monday, as did Stan Leonard of Vancouver, Leonard, playing probably the best golf of his career, was fourth in the Canadian Open.

Nashua To Travel In Style

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y. (AP)—Nashua will travel in style to Chicago for his Aug. 31 celebratory match race with Swaps.

When the Preakness and Belmont stakes champion boards the train tonight for his overnight trip, he will find the ultimate in comfort.

There will be a huge barrel of special water from Saratoga Springs to quench his thirst. The big thoroughbred guzzles 20 gallons a day.

One end of his horse pullman will be equipped with a cafeteria-style counter, with plenty of choice hay and oats.

Four aides of trainer Sunny Fitzsimmons will be in the car to answer the horse's every beck and call.

The car will have six doors. There will be a special bunk and plenty of room for Nashua to roam.

His trip to Chicago will take 16 1/2 hours. The cost: \$1,300.

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Baltimore Gained A Doubleheader Split With Chicago For The Second Day In A Row

Chicago White Sox out of first place as New York Yankees regained the top rung by rallying to defeat Detroit Tigers in the ninth inning.

The White Sox missed a golden opportunity to take a clear cut lead in the hot American League flag chase when they dropped the second game of both double bills Tuesday and Wednesday after winning the openers.

Bill Wight scattered nine hits as he defeated Chicago 2-1 in the nightcap after the Pale Hose had taken the opener 14-1 with 20 rattling hits.

Detroit seemed ready to take the Yankees down a peg for the second straight time, until Yogi Berra and Mickey Mantle slapper successive homers in the ninth inning to give New York a 2-2 decision.

BACK ON TOP Thus the Yankees, who dropped out of first place Tuesday, got back on top of the heap by half a game over Chicago.

Cleveland Indians remained a game behind the Yankees in third place as Mike Garcia shut out Boston Red Sox 2-0. This dropped Boston 4 1/2 games off the pace.

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White Sox romped in their opener, but should have saved some of the energy for the nightcap.
