

Australia's Roy Emerson Retains Singles Crown

WIMBLEDON (CP)—Defending-champion Roy Emerson easily retained his all-England lawn tennis singles crown Friday with a crushing 6-2, 6-4, 6-4, victory over fellow Australian Fred Stolle. The match lasted just 67 minutes.

The dull, one-sided match on a dull and chilly day made Stolle the champion runner-up in post-war Wimbledon history. It was the third year in succession he has been on the losing end of a singles final on the centre court.

Not once was the issue in doubt, and Emerson's victory was even more complete than his four-set triumph in 1964. In 1963 Stolle lost to Chuck McKinley of the U.S.

Emerson became the eighth Australian to capture the men's singles in the last 10 years.

The women's final today matches defending champion Mari. Bueno of Brazil and Margaret Smith of Australia.

Emerson's victory Friday was so complete that he apologized to the 15,000 who thronged the court because he felt they must have considered the final disappointing. Some lined up all night to get in.

Another 150,000,000 were estimated to have seen the match on the European television network.

Billie Jean Moffitt gave the U.S. a hope of a share of a title when she combined with Miss Bueno to defeat the American team of Nancy Richey and Mrs. Carole Graebner in a women's doubles semi-final match.

The Moffitt-Bueno pair will meet the French team of Francoise Durr and Nanine Liefbrig in the final.

This is the only event in which the Australians were shut out.

The men's doubles became an all-Aussie affair when Ken Fletcher and Bob Hewitt trounced Clark Graebner and Marty Reissen of the U.S. 7-5, 6-4, 6-4. The winners will meet fellow Australians John Newcombe and Tony Roche for the title.

It became all-Australian also in the mixed doubles final. Fletcher and Miss Smith eliminated Miss Bueno and Dennis Ralston of Bakersfield, Calif., 7-5, 6-4. In the all-Aussie second semi-final, Roche and Judy Tegart ousted defending champions, Stolle and Lesley Turner, 6-3, 7-9.

Rex Baxter Jr. Leads Western

CHICAGO (AP)—Rex Baxter Jr. shot a four-under-par 67 Friday in continuing a withering pace to hold the 36-hole lead in the \$70,000 Western Open golf tournament.

The Texan, winner of only one tourney in seven pro seasons, was only one stroke poorer than his opening 66 for a half-way total of 133 and a two-stroke lead over Al Geiberger, whose six-under-par 65 gave him 135.

Tam O'Shanter's par-71 course again was ripped apart by a field seeking the \$11,000 top prize.

Shooting 68s were Bill Garrett, PGA rookie; Billy Casper, and Frank Wharton, who moved into a third place tie with 136s.

Jack Fleck shot a 66 and jumped into a tie at 137 with Don Fairfield, Dave Hill, Dick Ryan and Ken Still.

Defending champion Juan Rodriguez, only a stroke behind Baxter after the first round, slumped to a par 71. That left the little Puerto Rican knotted with nine others at 138.

MONTREAL (CP)—David Molson, president of the Montreal Canadiens Hockey Club, said Friday the club will place its Omaha, Neb., Central Professional Hockey League in one of three Texas cities within three weeks.

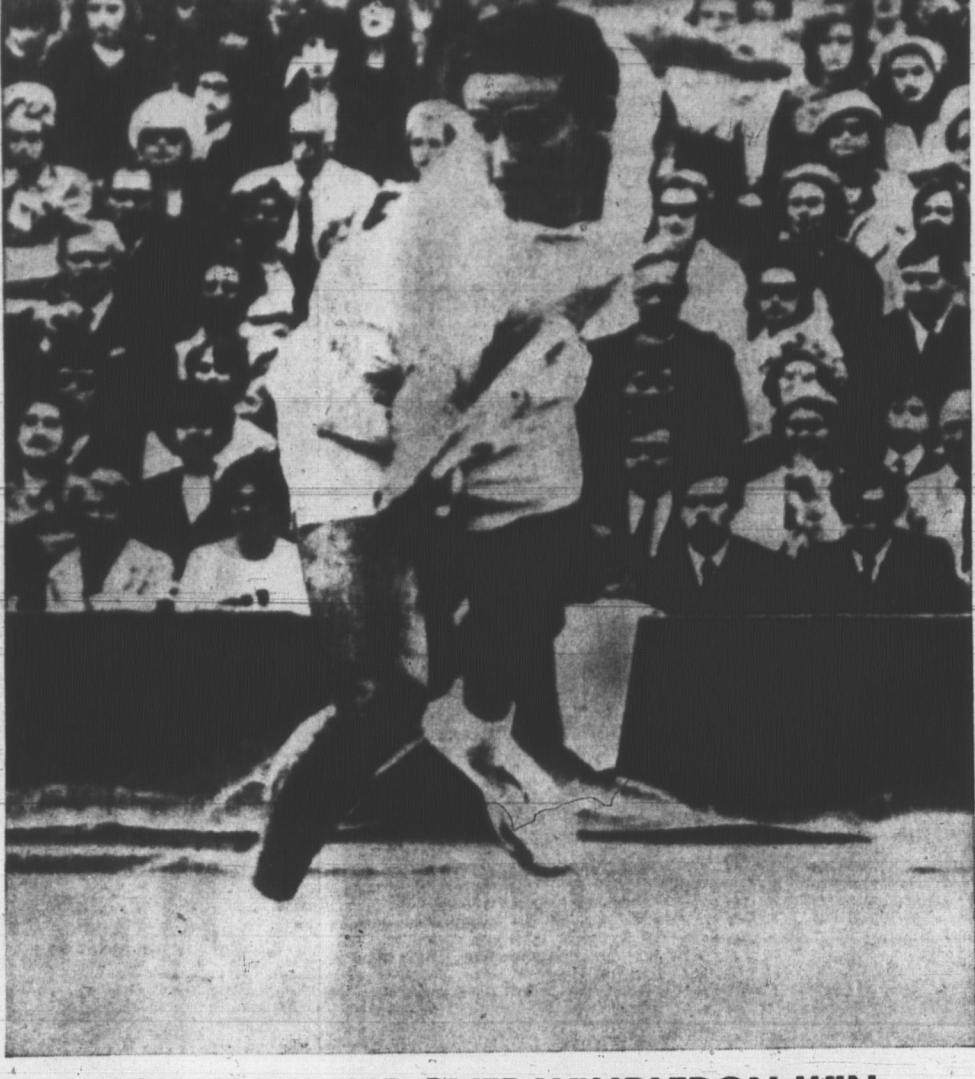

Last Canadian Rowers Are Eliminated By Eton

HENLEY ON THAMES (CP) Eton College rowers—surged from the starting gate with unexpected speed to lead a surprised schoolboy eight from Vancouver Island all the way in a quarter-final heat Friday of the Henley Royal Regatta's Princess Elizabeth Challenge Cup competition.

Shawinigan Lake school, carrying out coach Joe Grey's orders to "get out in front at the start," took off at a blistering 46-stroke-a-minute pace, but the powerful Eton crew opened a one-third length lead on only 42 strokes a minute.

The English crew, maintaining a slower stroke than the Canadians throughout the race, had its lead reduced to a "canvass" at the one-mile mark of the 1.5-mile heat. Despite a finishing burst of 57 by Shawinigan, Eton was pulling away

at the end, with a half-length separating the bows. Eton's time—six minutes, 50 seconds—was the fastest of the day in the schoolboy competition but fell short of the record 6:44 set by Emanuel school of London Thursday.

USED BORROWED SHELL
The Shawinigan crew, which paid its own way over and used a borrowed, English-built shell in its three heats, was the last of four Canadian entries to be eliminated in the four-day regatta, which ends today.

In Friday's pair-oar heats, Peter Gorny and Gunter Bergau, European champions from East Germany who set a pairs record Thursday at 7:35, ousted Ray Easterling and Jerry McCarthy of East London.

Gorny and Bergau meet Herman Boelen and Jim Enters of The Netherlands in today's Silver Goblets final.

In the premier Henley event, the Grand Challenge Cup for eights, the Olympic-winning Vesper crew from Philadelphia outlasted Nautilus Club, the pride of British rowing, to set

up a repeat today of the Tokyo games final.

The hefty U.S. oarsmen will meet their olympic opponents, West Germany's Ratzburg, NEVER WON CUP
Vesper defeated Nautilus by 3/4 lengths in Friday's semi-final. The West Germans, who have never won the Grand Cup, beat another British eight, the University of London, by three lengths.

A strong clash is expected in today's finals of the Double Sculls. A Swiss pair from Zurich, Martin Studach and Melchoir Burgin, meet East Germans Manfred Haake and Joachim Bruckaender for the title.

The Zurich crew eliminated the veteran British pair of George Justiz and Nick Birkmyre, who had won the trophy four times in the last five years.

Favorite for the individual Diamond Sculls, title is Don Spero of New York Athletic Club, U.S. champion and course record-holder. He meets Hugh Wardell, Verburgh of Britain. Spero beat Brian Forbes of Scotland easily Friday, in 8:18.

Can. Canoeing Proves Popular

LONDON (CP)—Britons and Germans will cross paddles on the shady upper reaches of the Thames Aug. 14 in a competition brought about by a common interest in Canadian-style canoeing.

Teams from five British clubs that race canoes regularly on the Thames will compete against 14 West Berliners at the annual Sunbury Regatta, held just up the river from historic Hampton Court.

Six members from each of the English clubs will be put up against the Germans who will borrow one of four canoes pooled by the Thames canoeists for the match.

The five clubs taking part are Twickenham, Richmond, the Royal Canoe Club, the Canoe Touring Club and the Ditton Canoe Club. All except the Royal, which first used canoes in 1890, were founded in this century.

Twickenham, however, was one of the first British clubs to adopt Canadian canoes and they now use them alongside the rest of their boats. They bought one six-man C-6 and were so pleased with its performance that they persuaded a local boat-builder, George Sims, to build them a second, larger boat from plans obtained from Germany.

Sims usually builds rowing boats—as does his brother, Richard, who now lives in Toronto—but he was willing to try his hand at canoes despite the difficulties.

"You use a different method," he explained later. "I did it anyway and it was good experience."

The canoe, an eight-man C-6 which they named Challenger, was a success and will be raced in the international in August.

Juan Marichal Blanks Cubs

CHICAGO (AP)—Juan Marichal joined Los Angeles' Sandy Koufax as the major league's only 13-game winners Friday, hurling San Francisco Giants to a 4-0 victory over Chicago Cubs.

Marichal, who has six shut-outs for the season and two in succession, scattered five hits and never allowed a runner to reach second base. Everybody in the Giant line-up except Marichal had at least one hit.

Willie Mays provided Marichal with all the support needed by driving in two runs. Tom Haller clipped in with his fourth homer of the season.

San Francisco scored its first run off loser Cal Koonce in the fourth on a triple by Willie McCovery and Mays' single. In the sixth the Giants loaded the bases on singles by Dick Schofield, Matty Alou and a walk to McCovery before Mays delivered a sacrifice fly.

Marichal's short shutout left him only one start of Koufax's league-leading total for the entire 1964 season.

Yankees Stand Chance To Shatter Old Records

NEW YORK (AP)—It's been exactly 40 years since the proud New York Yankees last wound up a season in the second division.

It's also been that long since a Yankee team wallowed below 500 in games won and lost on July 4, the traditional mid-summer mark.

The Yankees could easily duplicate both blights on their parallel record this year.

In 1925, the Yankees, under Miller Huggins, were in sixth place on July 4, 10 games below 500. They finished in seventh place with a dismal record of

69 victories and 95 defeats, a 448 percentage.

Through Thursday's games, the 1965 Yankees were in sixth place, three games below 500. They must win all four games to avoid remaining below the even-stephen figure on July 4.

The plight of the current Yankees bears a striking similarity to that of 1925. In that year, Babe Ruth, the Yankees' big gun, missed more than one-third of the season because of injuries. Injuries, of course, have plagued Mickey Mantle, as well as such key men as Roger Maris and Elston Howard this year.

Earle Combs was the only 300 hitter among the regulars. The pitching staff collapsed.

Manager Johnny Keane of the 1965 Yankees has given no indication of giving up. His only move that might indicate a concern of the future was his recall of outfielder Roger Repoz from Toledo last week.

The Yankees trail the league-leading Cleveland Indians by 10 games. It's by far the most they've been behind since Casey Stengel took over the managerial reins in 1949.

During those 16 years, the Yankees were never lower than second on July 4, with the exception of 1959. That season they were in fourth place, five behind the front runners. They wound up third. In 1954, they were 1/2 games behind on July 4 and they finished second.

These are the only two years in the last 16 that the Yankees did not win the pennant.
