

Bruins Upset Canadiens; Series Now Tied 1-All

MONTREAL (CP) — Boston Bruins, playing sharp, heads-up hockey backed by Don Simmons' great work in goal, struck early Thursday night to trounce Montreal Canadiens 5-2 and even the best-of-seven Stanley Cup final at a game apiece.

Bronco Horvath led the Boston goal drive with two, Don McKenney, Larry Regan and Norm Johnson getting the others. Bernie Geoffrion and Doug Harvey counted for Montreal.

The Bruins left no doubt about their superiority Thursday night. They had their first goal after only 20 seconds of play and ended the first period with a 3-1 lead.

For the first half of the game the Bruins' superiority was especially notable inside the blue lines — either one. They were sharper on the attack and better defensively. Their fine forechecking became more prominent as the game went along.

The game was less of the rough-house type that was produced in the series opener Tuesday, but nevertheless was a hard, grueling struggle.

Simmons, the slender netminder, broke the Montrealers' hearts time and again when Canadiens were able to drive into close quarters. His work easily eclipsed that of Montreal's Jacques Plante. Defensively Canadiens lacked their usual snap in clearance, particularly deep in their own area.

Getting an even break on the two games in Montreal, the Bruins now have a big chance to move in front when the series shifts to Boston for the third and fourth games, next Sunday and Tuesday.

Walter LePage's high-flying Trotters completed a sweep of their final series with St. Dunstan's University last night by defeating the Saints 42-38. The victory gave the Trotters their second consecutive Prince Edward Island Senior "C" Basketball Title. Last season the Trotters won the championship by winning the first and third games of a best of three series with the Saints.

The Trotters will now advance against either New Brunswick or Nova Scotia for the Maritime Senior "C" Championship. Father Clarence Roche and

Mark Ladner led the way for the Trotters with Roche collecting 14 points and Ladner 13. The odd part about Roche's performance was that he tossed in eight foul shots.

Donnie MacLean, the other member of the deadly trio had a slack night but still managed to get in 6 points. Red Howatt and Wayne MacDonald each connected for four while Irv. MacKinnon rounded out the scoring with a single point.

Goalie Praised On Boston Win

MONTREAL (CP)—The happy Boston Bruins, beating Montreal Canadiens 5-2 Thursday night and squaring the Stanley Cup final, swarmed into their dressing room and heaped praise on goalie Don Simmons.

"Simmons won it for us," said coach Milt Schmidt. The big difference was in goaltending.

Captain Fern Flaman, rugged Bruin defenceman, said flatly: "If it hadn't been for Simmons we would have lost."

Veteran Harry Lumley, Boston's other goalie, declared: "Simmons pulled us through in the clutch. It was the best game I have ever seen him play."

The slender 26-year-old goalie took all the acclaim calmly.

Coach Schmidt said he didn't think his club played any better than in Tuesday's opener, won by Montreal 2-1, but there were fewer "useless penalties."

He said he changed his strategy for this game. He ordered close checking instead of "aggressive" bumping.

"You can't play that aggressive style all the time. After all, the human body can take only so much."

"Where do people get the idea we are a rough team? Canadiens are the most penalized team in the league."

Schmidt said he thought his defencemen played well. He changed his forward lines frequently, "to keep 'em guessing."

Woodstock In Finals; Meets Lakeshore All-Stars

WOODSTOCK, N.B. (CP) Woodstock Senators, in quest of the Canadian Senior basketball championship, left here Thursday for Montreal where they meet Lakeshore All-Stars in the Eastern Canada finals tonight at the Lachine High School gymnasium.

The series, a two-game total round, will end Saturday night with the winner going against Sudbury YMCA in the Dominion finals.

Woodstock, the only Senior B team in New Brunswick, gained a spot in the Canadian playoffs when the Senators polished off St. Dunstan's University of Charlottetown. Woodstock took the first game 61-42 count and the second 82-62.

Coached by fiery Keith Jones, the Senators left town with a 10-man squad, including eight veterans of many senior battles and a pair of former interscholastic stars.

Well Buck Whitlock's Royals have conquered North Sydney Combines.

The Royals did it the hard way, trailing three to two in games in a best of seven series, before emerging as the series winner.

Now it's the New Glasgow Rangers.

Rangers and Royals, like most hockey clubs, couldn't agree among themselves on dates and sites for their best of five battle. So the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association was forced to intervene and settle the issue.

This is the setup. Royals open in New Glasgow tonight and play there again Saturday. Rangers return to Charlottetown for a two-game go on Monday and Tuesday. Should the series go to a fifth game it will be played at the rink which has drawn the largest crowds in their two games at home.

The gate of the fifth game must be split, as was the seventh game between Royals and Combines. However, an extra rider goes with this series.

After tax, the M. A. H. A. percentage and 40 per cent for the rink (this is for the fifth game only) \$200 is to be deducted for the visiting club to help with travelling expenses and the remainder is divided evenly between Royals and Rangers.

It rests entirely with the fans where a fifth game will be played should it be necessary. We can't see for a moment why Royals' supporters shouldn't make sure it's at the Sports Arena.

Anyway, it's their business now whether they want it or not. How about packing the Sports Arena for both games Monday and Tuesday.

Anyone who thinks the Royals' victory came easy on Wednesday night over Combines had better think again.

It was a bitter struggle and very much in doubt till the 13:20 mark of the final period. Those two goals within the space of 17 seconds rocked the persistent Combines back on their heels and they didn't show too much fight after that.

But in the first and second sessions they really poured it on, and it was only some terrific goal tending by Roper, plus some really tough luck by the Royals, that kept Whitlock and company on top.

Royals never trailed in any game here with the Combines but they could have easily been behind after 40 minutes of Tuesday's tussle.

We are not trying to discount Royals for a moment. They played it for keeps in that third session, with only a one-goal cushion to work on. They held the Cape Bretoners scoreless and added two to their own account.

Royals should give Rangers the battle of the year and lets hope the locals will have the privilege of playing before a crowd-packed arena.

It could be just the difference in giving Charlottetown a Maritime finalist in senior competition.

An automobile accident last June has caused Betty Lou MacLean, formerly of Victoria, P. E. I., to call it quits in the field of sports.

Betty is one of the Island's best known girl athletes with a long string of achievements behind her. At the age of 12 she scored 12 goals for Victoria School in the South Queen's Physical Fitness trophy. One year later she played with Borden National sisters and in that season potted 14 goals. In one season she changed in the amazing total of 71 goals in 16 games.

This season with the Abbie Sisters, Betty scored eight of the Abbies' goals against the opposition.

But this young athlete did not confine herself to hockey alone. She was outstanding in track and field and one afternoon at Summerside grabbed four trophies at a meet. She was skating champion at a provincial meet for girls 14 years and under and from 10 to 15 years of age she won every event she entered in Victoria and Craigavon rinks.

Betty is leaving behind a record that will indeed be difficult for any girl to equal. Folks who have witnessed her performances will long remember them. She

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
