## Conditions At Hospital Grow Worse

CORNER BROOK (CP) — Conditions at the strike-bound Westbrooke Hospital are growing worse, hospital administrator J. R. Orme said Monday.

Mr. Orme said nurses were doing their best to make sure the 50 patients, mostly children and pregnant women, were not neglected. But, he said, he agreed with a statement by Corner Brook doctors that a continuation of strike conditions could be harmful to the patients.

Monday some 15 children were transferred to the Corner Brook Sanatorium, relieving the pressure slightly.

About 110 members of Local 488, National Union of Public Employees (CLC), most of them nurses' aides and maids, are picketing the hospital.

The group wants higher wages and a modified union shop. A royal commission has been appointed to look into the union requests and the effect they would have on hospitals in the rest of the province.

Dr. Raymond Gushue, president of Memorial University in St. John's, says he is ready to start his one-man commission study of the dispute, but has not yet received his terms of reference from the provincial government.
