

Wing Commander Walker Retires At Summerside

SUMMERSIDE — The chief administrative officer at CFB Summerside for the last two years, Wing Commander W. R. (Revie) Walker, DFC, CD, retired last week from the RCAF after 26 years of continuous service.



Born and educated in Blainmore, Alberta, he commenced a distinguished career in the RCAF when he joined in August, 1940, at Calgary, Alberta. Graduating as a navigator in 1941 with the rank of sergeant, he was posted overseas and commenced his operational flying with 106 Squadron, Royal Air Force on the twin engine Hampden bombers. During the ensuing years of operations, he was destined to fly Manchester Lancasters and the high speed Mosquitos. From 1941 until 1944, Revie completed three tours of operational flying which in itself was a most commendable achievement. But what makes it even more outstanding is the fact that his third tour was flown with 617 Squadron, a special duties unit with the RAF. The squadron is famous as the "Dam Buster" Squadron and is probably familiar to most as it was the subject of a movie.

Apart from lobster trap limits the department is also studying the entire licensing structure of the commercial fishery in the Maritimes and Newfoundland and an announcement on the study can be expected this winter. Gordon P. Rodd, the secretary-treasurer of the F.E.I. Fisheries Federation received this information in a letter from Hon. H.J. Robichaud, the federal minister of fisheries.
