## Thieves Loot Car, House At S'side

SUMMERSIDE — Burglars were on the prowl sometime late Sunday night when they entered the home of Dr. J.C. Simpson, Beaver Street through the unlocked back door and made off with a handbag owned by Mrs. Simpson containing a small amount of money and some papers. The thieves then went to the corner of Beaver and Duke Streets where a visiting Nova Scotia car was parked and ransacked the vehicle getting away with another handbag containing papers, a watch and a cigarette lighter.

Police know the same burglars did the two jobs as papers from Mrs. Simpson's handbag were found near the burgled car which was owned by David Mugridge of Dartmouth, N.S.

Mr. Mugridge heard noises near his car around midnight and came out of the house of Erskine Waite where he was visiting and saw two-teen age boys running east on Beaver Street, away from the scene.

## Wood Islands Store Levelled By Fire Sat.

Fire totally destroyed the store operated by James MacBeath, at Wood Islands, and almost completely destroyed the warehouse situated a short distance from the main building.

Of unknown origin the blaze was first discovered at about 9:00 o'clock Saturday evening and it quickly gained headway and was soon out of control, despite the efforts of residents in the vicinity and a large number whose aid was sought from among those attending a concert in the Eldon Hall.

At one time during the height of the blaze the home of James Jardine was threatened and volunteers removed all the furniture. But the bucket brigade shifted their efforts from the burning store and by keeping the roof and walls of the Jardine residence dampened down prevented the fire from spreading.

The store property is owned by the Northumberland Fertilizer Limited and was leased by Mr. MacBeath. It was not possible to obtain an estimate of the value of the damage a late hour last night.

## Miscouche Flats Accident Sends One Man To Hospital

SUMMERSIDE — A car accident on the Miscouche Flats about one-mile west of the village of Miscouche, which occurred about 5:30 Friday evening resulted in Alfred (Toady) Cahill of Summerside being sent to the Prince County Hospital for a period of two days. After treatment for his injuries he was released from the hospital on Sunday.

The incident occurred when the car, a taxi with the Star Cab of Charlottetown, owned by Ernest Corbett, Charlottetown, and driven by Leonard Elmo Arsenault, also of Charlottetown, apparently went out of control and careened off the highway into the brush at the side of the road.

Both the driver and the second passenger, Ellsworth Waite of Summerside, were only shaken up and sustained minor cuts and bruises. Neither required hospitalization. Considerable damage was caused to the car a 1959 Dodge sedan an estimate of the value of which will not be available until sometime today.

In its headlong rush off the highway the vehicle is reported to have rolled over once or twice and came to a stop after travelling approximately 100 feet through the alder underbrush. Its resting place was almost invisible from the highway.
