Newly Ordained Priest Is Honoured



—On June 29th the Rev. Father Plus F. J. Levesque, native of Bloomfield Parish, P. E. I., received the Sacrament of Holy Orders from His Excellency, Bishop Camille LeBlanc, D.D., of Bathurst. The ceremony was held in Bathurst East Church with twenty-six monsignori and priests present.

A sumptuous banquet, prepared by the parish's "45 Women Organization" was held in the Parish School Auditorium. The Rev. Father Levesque and his curate Father Patrice Doucet presented the new priest with a beautiful cathedral cake. During the banquet, presided over by His Excellency the Bishop, professional singers rendered Gounod's Ave Maria, Cesar Franck's Panis Angelicus and other excerpts from the classics. The Boy Scouts waited on the tables. The toastmaster, Father Levesque, first called upon His Excellency to speak, who was followed by other dignitaries.

After the banquet the new priest motored back to the Island with the other members of his family and friends to sing his first Solemn High Mass on July 1st in St. Anthony's Church at Bloomfield. Well over 1,000 people witnessed the ceremony. The Reverend pastor, Father M. J. Rooney, was high priest; Father Roche of St. Dunstan's University was deacon, and Father Gallant of Egmont Bay was sub-deacon. Sermons in English and French were delivered by the deacon and sub-deacon. The able choir was under the direction of its president, J. Albert Noonan. C. J. Gallant was at the organ. To the desire of the newly ordained priest, Gregorian Chant was preferred to polyphony.

Enjoyable Banquet After the Mass, the parish gave a delicious banquet in the hall which was attended by about 150 convives. The toastmaster, Father M. J. Rooney, called on the Rev. Fathers W. E. Monaghan, Aylward, Trainer and MacKenna to speak. They were followed by Dr. J. H. Blanchard and the Hon. J. W. Arsenault, Provincial Secretary. After the banquet a steady inflow of people visited the home of the parents, Mr. and Mrs. John F. Finner, where a reception was held. At 7 o'clock Solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament was given, after which the parish presented the newly ordained priest with a substantial purse. Addresses were read in English and French by Mr. P. A. Arsenault, professor, and Mr. Aubin Gallant, B.A., a new graduate of St. Joseph's University.

Father Finner first studied in his home school in Woodstock, underwent his classical course at Bourget College, Rigaud, P. Q., affiliated with the University of Montreal, and took up his theology in Holy Heart Seminary, Halifax, and with the Clerics of St. Viators in Rigaud, P. Q. While a college student he was at the same time president of his class, president of the Catholic Youth Organization which helped form the Federation in the Valleyfield diocese; president of the Congregation of Blessed Virgin; vice-president of the Band, and member of the Schola Cantorum. He also helped to inaugurate the College Credit Union and Cooperative Movement.

Father Finner will exercise his ministry at Sacred Heart Cathedral in Bathurst. He is the first new priest from Bloomfield Parish, which is 150 years extant.
