## MORE NEWS FROM AFRICA

Bank Cottage, Church Street, Wellington, C. C. Dec. 6th, 1899.

DEAR MRS. McRAE,—Now that I have commenced writing to you I feel I must continue to do so, unless you request me to refrain. I was interrupted so often while writing and had to finish so hurriedly that I trust you will pardon all errors.

It was one of our days for collecting fruit, delicacies etc., for the sick and wounded at Orange River; and the knocks at the front door were very frequent. There are a few loyal families in the town, and we want to do what we can for those who are doing so much for us. There are many wealthy people in Cape Town and suburbs, so the base hospital at Wynberg is well supplied. And we send all we can up north. Then when the ambulance trains pass south with their sad freight we have been able to take them milk, strawberries, jellies, custards, and such like. This is not told in boastfulness, dear madam, but because I feel sure you will be pleased to hear these details.

The ambulance trains are splendidly fitted up, with about 80 or 90 cots in each, two lady nurses, and a large staff of male helpers, doctor and pharmacy, cook, assistants &c. The kitchen and pantry are most comfortable, and they have a refrigerator to keep fruit, &c., cool, to take back when they return empty.

On the 30th November a number of the Gordon Highlanders passed north, some of whom helped to storm Dargai. A few days before the British Grenadiers went up, and one rather middle-aged man told us he had been through the Zulu campaign in Natal, and fought at Isildan wana. The South African Review, of December 1st, a very reliable weekly paper, has the following:

"The arrival of the Canadian volunteers by the Sardinian on Wednesday afternoon was a sight never to be forgotten by those who witnessed it. Every steamer in the bay joined in the welcome. They were dressed in rainbow fashion from stem to stern, blowing their whistles and sirens and making a terrific din. As the Sardinian drew along side the lock jetty the band of the Dannebrog Castle played the "Soldiers of the Queen," but the climax of the enthusiasm was reached when "God Save the Queen" was sung. It brought the lump into many a throat; the scene may be imagined but not described. Over a thousand men stood at attention and sang the National Anthem winding up with three hearty British cheers. When one sees such enthusiasm as this it furnishes a striking proof of the decadence of the British Empire is not at hand yet and that with our big fleet, and, if necessary, millions of such colonists at our call in the hour of need, prepared if necessary to lay down their lives when the bugle calls, we may still hope to hold our own."

A very touching tribute comes from the coloured leper patients who are confined on Robben Island, they raised a subscription and sent the contribution to the military secretary "in aid of her Majesty's wounded soldiers."

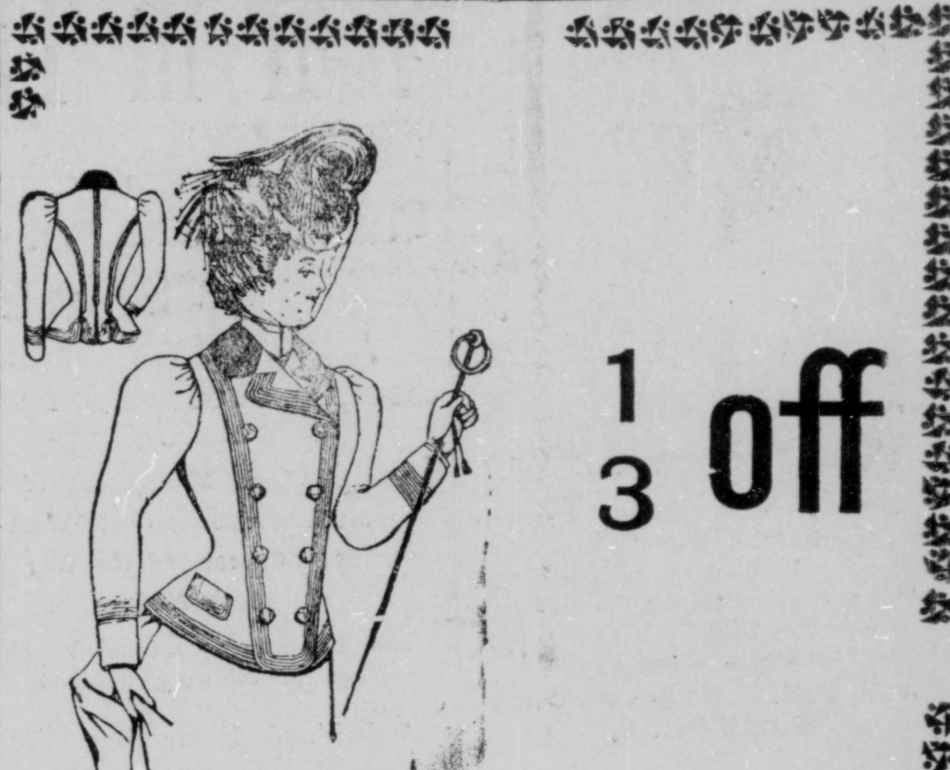
