Howard Beattie told the visitors that the Engineers were getting \$150, and the Model UN \$650, both groups were visibly unhappy.

Engineer John MacIsaac said that President Michelle Dorsey, not present at the meeting, had told him two weeks earlier that there was still \$1800 in the budget for donations to sub-organizations, clubs, and charities.

Apparently, this figure did not take into account the donation to the Memorial Bursary Fund the \$2000 had also been used for. This came to \$1100.

Treasurer Ken Mutter had had to leave the meeting to greet presidential candidate John Morgan to the campus, and on his return confused Councillors even more by telling them there was still

\$1500 left, but "that doesn't mean we have to delete the fund."

The Engineers, who had stayed to appeal the decision after the Model UN left, were told they could return at the next meeting to ask again.

They will still be able to send their class to New Brunswick, as they have \$1600 in their account.

## Financial Aid

Don't forget, tomorrow is the deadline for apply for the UPEI Memorial Bursary, Part-time Student Bursary, and Bernardine Hall Bursary.

The Kidney Foundation of Canada is offering summer Student Fellowships for work on a research project related to the kidney or urinary tract.

The student must be enrolled in the Faculty of Science or Medicine of a Canadian University. The value of the fellowship is \$2000 for a 12-week period of study. Deadline for applications is February 28.

The Saint-Thomas Aquinas Society offers bursaries to Island students for post graduate study in a french language institution. Pertinence of course of study to Acadian/Francophone issues on PEI is one of the criteria for selection. Deadline for application is February 28.

The Canadian Library Association offers several scholarships to students who

will be attending an accredited Canadian Library School. Consideration is given to academic standing

and financial need. Awards range in amount from \$1750 to \$2500. Deadline for application is March 1st.

## CONTRIBUTE TO THE THIRD WORLD THROUGH WUSC

On Thursday, February 7 at 6:30 p.m., there will be an information meeting in Kelly 237 concerning the establishment of a World University Service — Canada (WUSC) local committee.

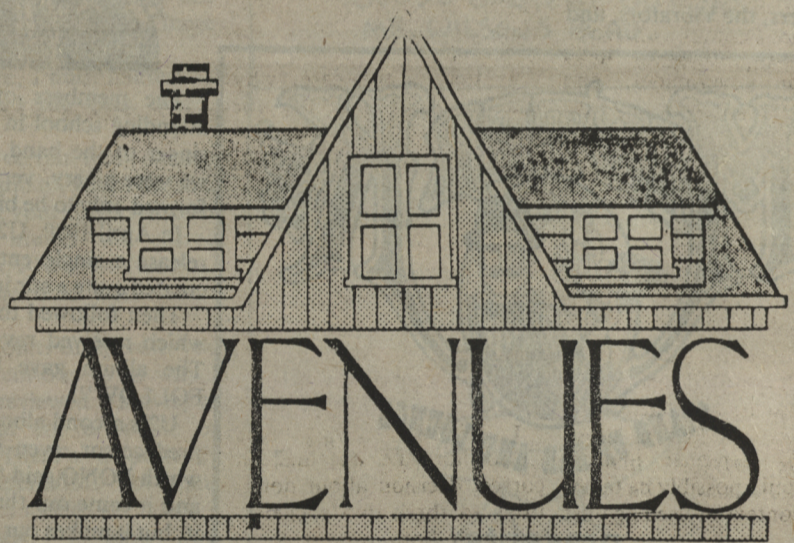
WUSC is a Canadian non-governmental organization whose aim is to contribute to Third World Development. Established in 1938, WUSC has historically been a university-based organization.

At the present time, there are over 40 WUSC local committees on campuses of Canadian colleges and universities.

The campus committee participate in a variety of activities including raising money to sponsor African refugees at universities in Canada, advertising and recruiting for the annual WUSC seminar which sends 30 Canadian University students to a Third World country for six weeks every summer and sponsoring Caravan which sells African handicrafts on Canadian campuses.

WUSC also recruits Canadian teachers to work in the Third World. At the present time, there are ten Islanders recruited by WUSC working in Zimbabwe, Botswana, Malawi and Lesotho.

All interested students, staff and faculty are invited to attend this information meeting and find out how they can aid the Third World through WUSC.
