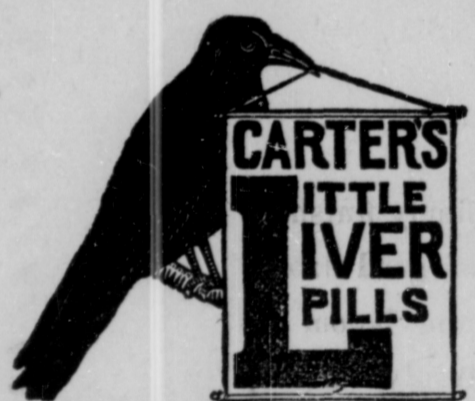
ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

Will Repair in Boston.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—Orders were issued from the navy department yesterday for a fleet of six warships to proceed from Hampton Roads to Boston for repairs. They are the Detroit, Helena, Topeka, Wilmington, Castine, and Marietta. All but the Wilmington are at Hampton Roads, having just arrived from Key West, and on the arrival of the Wilmington a start will be made for Boston. It is expected that Boston will be reached the latter part of the week. Announcements were made of the arrival of the monitors Amphitrite, Puritan and Terror at Guanica, Porto Rico.

# THE RECONQUEST OF THE SOUDAN

## Khartoum Will be Captured and Mahdism Smashed Within a Month.

THE ASSAULT ON KHARTOUM

Britain Will Remain in the Soudan for All Time to Come, Cost What it May.

LONDON, Aug. 23.—The Anglo-Egyptian reconquest of the Soudan is steadily approaching its culmination. Khartoum will be captured and Mahdism smashed within a month, but Englishmen have not yet reached the stage of excitement over what is one of the most remarkable and uninterrupted successful military enterprises in British history.

Gen. Kitchner is the youngest man of his rank in the British army. He has made no mistakes, and now has a perfectly equipped army of 25,000 men of all arms, 1,700 miles from starting point, and ready to deliver the last crushing blow upon the enemy. There has been no fust, and this fact has lulled foreign suspicion as to the aims of British policy in the Soudan.

If the French think about the matter at all they assume that Gen. Kitchner will clear out of the Soudan as soon as the Dervishes are finally defeated. The assumption is unfounded, whatever the British Government may have said a year or two ago. The intention now is to keep the Soudan and more. Its policy embraces the possibility—nay, the probability—of war with Abyssinia, despite King Menelek's newly found friends in Paris and St. Petersburg. The purely British regiments will be gradually withdrawn from the Soudan, but Gen. Kitchner's Egyptian, transformed by him from spiritless peasants into real fighting men, and the Soudanese warriors, who have learned to worship their British officers, will remain to extend and complete the scheme of conquest. General Kitchner's flag, nominally Egyptian, will be taken to the borders of Uganda, there to get the British flag now upheld by a handful of Englishmen thousands of miles from civilization. It is a scheme to stir the imagination, yet it was born in prosaic Downing Street.

Richness in Labrador.

HALIFAX, Aug. 23.—A big find of a valuable mineral deposit is reported from Labrador coast. The find was made by two men named McBain of this city, who went with Rev. Mr. Clay in the schooner Cambridge in June on an exploring trip. They brought home samples of the mineral, but were ignorant of its real value at first, and were surprised to find that the mineral was white sapphire, which is largely used for manufacturing purposes. It is scarce and it is worth a lot of money. Its appearance it resembles mica, and is easily broken. The find was near Hamilton's inlet on the Labrador coast. McBain intends to push the thing along, now that he knows the real thing. The stuff is said to be deposited in large quantities, and a further search of the country will be made.

A Murder Case.

NEW CARLISLE, Aug. 24.—The trial of Theodule Poirier for the murder of Jerome Martin, has already created great interest. On the 3rd of April last, Theodule Poirier was spending the evening at a Mr. Dorion's in the village of St. Alexis. Jerome Martin was at Mr. Gallant's. The two residences are not far from each other. The two visitors were bitter enemies and the one had decided to meet the other that night and have it out. They met on the road soon after 10 o'clock. Both Poirier and Martin, it is said, were in love with Miss Dorion. They wanted to settle it at once for all that one or the other should drop out. They quarrelled for some time, when finally Martin took his coat to fight. Poirier immediately took his jack-knife and struck Martin in the throat severing the jugular vein. Martin died in a few moments. People here sympathize greatly with the prisoner. He is a fine fellow, they say, and must have been temporarily insane and did not know what he was doing.

### SIRDAR'S INFORMERS.

How the News Comes from Khartoum to the British Army.

CAIRO, Aug. 23.—The accuracy of the information which the Sirdar obtains respecting the movements of the Khalifa has enabled him to make his dispositions for the present advance on Khartoum with the utmost precision.

Prior to the fall of Berber the Intelligence Department had frequently much difficulty in judging of the opposition that was likely to be met to the advance, but since then their work has been much simplified.

When Berber was captured a number of merchants were found there who had correspondents in Khartoum. They were left unmoistened on the understanding that they furnished all the information they obtained to the Egyptian forces. Fully appreciating the direction in which their interests lay, they have faithfully kept to their share of the bargain.

On the other hand, they have doubtless told, probably with some embellishment, the preparations which were being made for the advance on Khartoum. The result has been to bring over many waverers to our side, and there is no doubt that the Mahdi is beginning to find himself in a tight place. There is little probability that there will be any resistance of a serious character before Khartoum is reached, and no doubt that the defeat of the Khalifa there will mean the final break-up of his power.

In conversation with Colonel Wingate, Mahmond, Khalifa's general, who was captured at the battle of Atbara, said that at the mosque at Omdurman there are forty-seven rows of fighting men, with 1,500 warriors in each row.

The latest intelligence from Omdurman leaves little doubt that the Khalifa intends to resist to the last. His bodyguard, his own tribesmen, and blacks will probably fight desperately, but all the rest of the Soudan would.

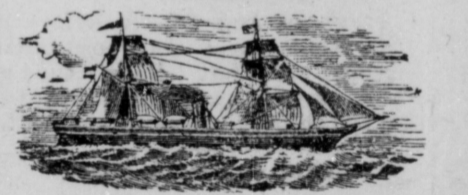
