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Detroit And Boston Both Have Shutouts At Home

DETROIT (AP)—Team captain Alex Delvecchio scored twice as Detroit Red Wings beat the puncheon Chicago Black Hawks 3-0 in a National Hockey League game Thursday night. Detroit goalie Roger Crozier never looked sharper in gaining his second shutout of the season. Delvecchio opened the scoring in the second period. Defenceman Leo Boivin scored a goal late in the third period, and Delvecchio got his second 58 seconds later. The Wings appeared listless in the first period but gained steam as the game progressed and completely overwhelmed the Hawks in the final period. For his first goal, Delvecchio slipped behind a Chicago defenceman just inside the blue line, took a pass from Dean Prentice and went in alone on Denis DeJordy, lifting the puck over DeJordy's left shoulder from just outside the crease. Boivin took a pass from Gordie Howe, who had dug the puck out of the corner, and blazed a shot through a forest of legs to score from about 40 feet out. Delvecchio's second goal came when he slipped behind the Chicago defence, took a pass from Howe at his own blue line, raced in on DeJordy and fired from 10 feet. Lou Angotti missed the best chance for a Chicago goal when he got the puck past Crozier in the final period. But the shot hit a goal post and bounced out. SUMMARY First period - No scoring. BOSTON (AP)—Rookie goalie Gerry Cheevers, recalled from the minors only four days ago, fashioned his first National Hockey League shutout Thursday night as Boston Bruins snapped Toronto's seven-game unbeaten streak by blanking the Maple Leafs 4-0 at the Garden. Cheevers, 25, drafted from the Leafs in June, 1965, and called up from Oklahoma City of the Central League to replace injured Ed Johnston, turned in a sparkling performance while kicking out 31 Toronto shots. Murray Oliver put the Bruins in front with his second goal of the season when he converted a rebound of a Bob Dillabough shot just 77 seconds after the opening faceoff. With Toronto shorthanded midway through the opening period, Johnny Bucyk backhanded a rebound past Leaf goalie Terry Sawchuk, upping the count to 2-0. Pit Martin, with a tremendous second effort to keep the puck from Toronto winger Ron Ellis, swept in and scored his sixth goal of the campaign in the second period. Wayne Connelly accounted for the fourth Boston goal by steering home a long shot by Ron Schock early in the final session. The victory enabled the Bruins to climb out of last place over the idle New York Rangers. Toronto had won three games and tied four in this unbeaten string before suffering its second loss of the campaign. The Leafs outshot the Bruins 31-23, but were unable to break through Cheevers. Souris Breaks SDHS To Win Island Bowl 41-13 The Souris Spartans walloped the Saint Dunstan's High School Football team 41-13 yesterday afternoon in front of the largest Potato Bowl crowd in the league's history. The match between the two league giants decided the Island High School League Football Championship and marked the emergence of a new power in Island football. Souris at the beginning of the season was a highly underrated team which was given virtually no chance against the perennially victorious Saints but as the season progressed, every team in the league in turn felt the pain of the bruising Spartan offence as they racked up a record of four wins, a tie, and only one loss in regular season play. The single loss was to defending champions Saint Dunstan's. Their tie was the final game of league play against a surprisingly strong Summerside High out to play the role of spoiler in what threatened to be a potential duel between the Saints and the Spartans. The Charlottetown club ended the season with a 4-2 record, second to Souris. This edge gave the Spartans the right to host the High School Classic. The scoring started quickly yesterday with the Spartans picking up a quick 10-0 lead, using their muscle and speed with the characteristic ability they demonstrated on their way to the first place finish in regular season play. The Saints seemed to rally immediately after this Spartan scoring burst. First Dennis Affleck bombed over the line to bring the score to 13-7, then the powerful Tex MacDonald converted and added a major of his own to tie the score at thirteen - all. But the assault fizzled and under the ramrodding of Quarterback Eric White, the Spartans began racking up points. Souris' freshman coach Brock Bradford directed the Spartan offence, utilizing his consistent two way man John McCormack and the fast running Gerard Galant to the best advantage, in a contest that saw the Saints thoroughly outclassed.

Canada, Knudson Leading, Second Round Of Cup Begins TOKYO (AP)—Record-breaking George Knudson of Canada, with a spectacular first-round, eight-under-par 64, led the way into today's second round of the Canada Cup international golf tournament, but his two-stroke lead over 17 rival professionals was a precarious one. In the team contest, Canada held a one-stroke lead at 194 over four other countries. Frank Fowler of Calgary shot a two-under-par 70. The weather again promised to be good for this 14th edition of the event, one in which two invited players from each of 36 countries and regions compete. Two shots back of Knudson were Arnold Palmer of the United States, Kel Nagle of Australia and Japan's Hideyo Sugimoto, whose brilliant 31-35-66 held up all day until Knudson stormed in with his 64. Knudson, formerly of Winnipeg and now of Toronto, shot 64-64 and broke the Canada Cup one-round record of 65. He shot the 64 Thursday on the Tokyo Yemini Country Club course, a hilly test that measures 6,962 yards and has par 36-72. HIS FINEST ROUND "I'd have to say it was the finest round I ever shot, especially that 30 on the back nine," said Knudson. "It had been hoped to limit spectators to 5,000 because this is not a spectators' course. But the largest golf turnout ever seen in Japan, an estimated 12,000, swarmed all over the place Thursday. Visitors were told the Japanese, never much interested in golf before, have gone slightly golf-crazy. They are convinced. Palmer turned in a steady 33-33-66, while the other American entry, Jack Nicklaus, had to settle for a 36-33-69. The United States, Formosa, Japan and Australia were deadlocked at 135 for second place in the team competition an defending champion South Africa followed with 138. Knudson stole the show on the first day. "The greens were perfect," said the Canadian, who banged out five straight birdies starting with the 10th hole. He added another on the 17th and almost holed out from 40 feet on the last green. His birdie puts were from three, seven, 25, 10, 5 and eight feet.

REGINA (CP)—The champion Saskatchewan Roughriders hold a narrow statistical margin over Winnipeg Blue Bombers as the clubs prepare to meet Sunday in the opening game of the best-of-three Western Football Conference final. Figures showed Saskatchewan with 967 yards in total offence compared with an offensive output of 929 yards by the Bombers, who finished second and downed Edmonton Eskimos 16-8 in a sudden-death semi-final. Individually, the leader in games between the two clubs was halfback Dave Raimey of Winnipeg. He compiled 194 yards rushing and 183 yards passing. His rushing average was 7.8 yards a carry and he caught eight of 10 passes. Other leading receivers for Winnipeg were Billy Cooper with 144 yards on six receptions in as many attempts and Farrell Funston with 110 yards on seven receptions in seven chances. Fullback George Reed paced the Roughriders in individual rushing with 313 yards on 51 carries for an average of 6.1 yards a carry. Gord Barwell caught seven passes in seven attempts for 118 yards and Hugh Campbell com-

pleted 110 yards on six receptions in six tries. Possibly a hidden weapon for coach Eagle Keys of Saskatchewan is halfback Ed Buchanan. He played only one game before retiring for most of the season with a leg injury. In his lone appearance, he rambled for 77 yards on five carries for a whopping average of 15.4 yards a carry. Keys said Wednesday he was undecided whether to use Buchanan or linebacker Wally Dempsey in the last import vacancy. Dempsey's value was enhanced when rookie Cliff Shaw bruised a knee in a workout on frozen turf. Shaw, a linebacker, joined second-string centre Galen Wahlmeier on the injured list. Wahlmeier suffered a knee injury in the last game of the regular season and is certain not to play.
