### SUPREME COURT.

WEDNESDAY, May 26.

The Supreme Court met today, Chief Justice Sullivan, Mr. Justice Hodgson and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald on the bench. Judgments were delivered in the following cases, after which the court adjourned sine die:

**James H. Watts vs. James Kennefic.**—This was an action on the sale of a horse in which defendant warranted his ownership, but in which it turned out that he had no title. The plaintiff sued on the warranty and the case was tried last Hilary Term and verdict found for the plaintiff an application was then made for a new trial. The Court today unanimously refused a new trial and ordered the verdict to stand, holding that a person who warrants his title to goods which in fact he does not own is liable for an action at the suit of the purchaser, immediately after the sale and that the purchaser need not wait until his possession is disturbed by the real owner before bringing action.

**Cahill vs. Commercial Union Insurance Co.**—Approval from a decision at Chambers given by Mr. Justice Hodgson setting aside the service of the writ in this case. The Court unanimously dismissed the appeal.

**Perry vs. Chais.**—Action of slander tried at Summerside last October before Mr. Justice Fitzgerald and a jury. An application was afterwards made to enter a nonsuit on the ground that the words complained of, taken in context with the whole discourse, were not actionable and that in any event they were spoken on a privileged occasion. The Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald delivered written opinions refusing the nonsuit. Mr. Justice Hodgson read a written opinion holding that a nonsuit should be entered.

THE IRENE MORRIS.—The steamer Irene Morris, Captain Clark, now being loaded with oats for the English market by Messrs. Matheson and Toombs, will leave this port for Souris on Friday evening. By the time she will leave Souris the Irene Morris will have upwards of 100,000 bushels on board. About 75,000 bushels will be taken on board at Charlottetown and the remainder at Souris. The rapidity with which the work of unloading and loading the steamer at Charlottetown took place is worthy of note. The work of discharging began on Friday morning at nine o'clock, and about 1600 tons of freight was removed. Then the work of placing the cargo of oats on board began, and everything will be in readiness for her sailing on Friday evening.
