

# Churchill Appears Headed For Top Shipping Season

CHURCHILL, Man. (CP)—Manitoba's only deep sea port appears headed for a record shipping season.

Ships have been arriving two weeks in advance of their schedules. A total of 49 cargoes already are booked and the target has been set for 50 ships, which would be an all-time record.

Officials said Friday that they are confident that extra sailings from the port 610 miles north of

Winnipeg—if there are any—would not leave without cargo. **HEAVY WHEAT BUSINESS** expected to move 15,000,000 bushels of wheat out of the Hudson Bay port. Last year, a record 13,500,000 bushels were cleared from Churchill and 11,500,000 in 1954. The Irish Elm of British registry and the 20th ship to enter the port this season cleared the harbor Tuesday with 500,000 bushels of grain for the United Kingdom. The docks remained empty until the arrival of the Carmelia Friday. Three other vessels are expected in today. All had passed the straits inward bound. The harbor will reach a new high in activity between Sept. 6 and 10 when six ships, still not identified, are expected to arrive.

**CARRY SCREENINGS**  
 This season, two lake boats of Canadian registry plying between Montreal, Toronto and Churchill laden with DEW line equipment, have returned east laden with screenings and oats for feed. In past years, screenings from the Churchill elevator have been shipped out by rail. Along with the increased shipping activity, the Canadian National Railways freighting into Churchill also has been stepped up. Grain train after grain train was being rushed over the rails to the 5,000,000-bushel elevator here. Home-building at the port is keeping pace with the grain movement. Ten homes are being constructed and further construction is expected shortly. Also being erected is a big warehouse and refrigeration plant. Recently completed was a building containing a completely automatic 200-line telephone exchange. It was built on tundra and 38 truckloads of gravel were used as a bed before the foundation could be poured. Telephones will be installed soon and the service is expected to begin in late October.

## Pressing Search For Minerals In Newfoundland

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Premier Smallwood said Tuesday M. J. Boylen mining companies have spent nearly \$7,000,000 on mineral exploration in Newfoundland to date and plan to spend an additional \$50,000,000 on development. He said the companies already had 23 diamond drills churning hundreds of feet into the earth seeking out new base metal discoveries. Mr. Smallwood said in an interview that never in the history of Newfoundland had one company taken on such an extensive drilling program. He was quoting details of a report made to him by M. J. Boylen, Toronto mining magnate, who left Newfoundland Tuesday after a visit. Mr. Smallwood said 1,100 men receive direct employment from Boylen investigations and developments, three years after he invited Mr. Boylen to come to Newfoundland. Some 550 of the total were employed at Tilt Cove on the northeast coast where old copper mines were being prepared for production. A \$1,000,000 pier and storage shed capable of holding six months production was under construction at Tilt Cove, Mr. Smallwood said. "The rest," he said, "are scattered about at various concessions which the government has given Mr. Boylen." The premier said Mr. Boylen has drills operating at Bale Verte, Tilt Cove, Little Bay, the Gull Fund area, Mount Misery and Sunday Cove Island. All are on the northeast coast.
