Instead of helping himself to one sausage, he seized the plate, placed it before him, and proceeded to devour the sausage after another, not neglecting the gravy, either, until the garnishes alone remained to show the havoc he had made. Coming to the end of his special about the same time that he finished the last sausage, he looked at the gloomy faces about him then at the empty dish, discovered what had been the meaning of one Professor Hago and his distracted spouse to interrupt his flow of language, and, of course, made no false apology. But he was never invited to that house for supper again—the chance of being left supperless themselves was too great for his hosts to risk it a second time.

London Crossing-Sweepers. A shilling a day is the limit of the average income of the London crossing-sweepers, and this is rather an over than an under calculation, since, although a few of the luckier who are to be found in the West End squares of the fashionable thoroughfares, or opposite government offices or banking houses may possibly earn twelve or fifteen shillings, a week, there are a large number of them to be found in the by-roads of the metropolis who as their earnings are small, they are obliged to take eightpence a day for their daily necessities. As proof positive of their precarious position, they refer to the fact that they receive so many leaves of bread a week as to be obliged to take to the streets, and the negro crossing-sweepers, who, although they are not so numerous as the white men, still appear to have been the last member of the class whose earnings were above his actual necessities.—London Telegraph.

Pleasant Methods of Dying. "Death by strangulation," said Dr. E. L. Henry, of Baltimore, "is the most pleasant way to die. Hanging, drowning, opiate poisoning and asphyxiation with air to the person is a fearful and painful death. Drowning, usually a most beautiful panorama of landscape views floats through the brain, and there is a sensation of floating through space in the air. But the most pleasant way to die is by strangulation. The man who is strangled is not aware of his death until he is dead. The man who is hanged is aware of his death from the moment he is hanged. The man who is drowned is aware of his death from the moment he is drowned. The man who is asphyxiated is aware of his death from the moment he is asphyxiated. The man who is poisoned is aware of his death from the moment he is poisoned. The man who is strangled is the most pleasant way to die."

Pretty Necks. Mrs. Jenness Miller says: Few women have pretty necks; most of them having a prominent bone. If they are fat it is cushioned, but still it is like an ugly piece of dough. This can be gotten rid of by leaving off the corset, dropping the shoulders, raising the chest and getting control of the abdominal muscles.
