

Driver Fined \$85 On Two Charges

SUMMERSIDE — Lowell Lloyd Oliver, Summerside, was given a sentence of \$75 and 15 days in Prince County jail by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County magistrate's court yesterday when he was convicted of having care and control of a motor vehicle while his ability was impaired by alcohol. He had earlier pleaded not guilty.

On a second charge of driving without due care and attention, Oliver changed his plea to guilty and was fined \$10 and costs. RCMP evidence revealed he accused drove at an excessive rate of speed, passing on white lines and curves. J. Watson MacNaught, KC, was defence counsel on both charges.

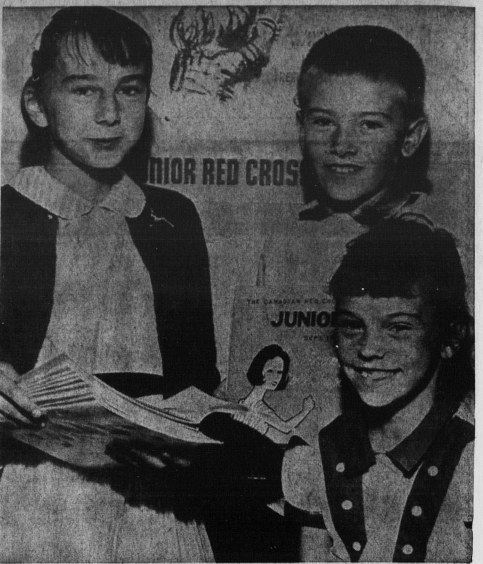

The case of Carl Everett Ford, Mount Pleasant, charged with having care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired, was dismissed by Magistrate MacDonald yesterday on the grounds that insufficient evidence had been produced. Ford was counselled by J. Watson MacNaught.

Benjamin Joseph Gallant, Summerside, charged with driving while his ability was impaired by alcohol and also with leaving the scene of an accident without leaving his name and address, appeared for a date to be set for the hearing of the evidence in the case. He had earlier pleaded not guilty to both charges.

Erwin Kenneth Cain, Miscouche Flats, charged with driving without due care and attention, pleaded not guilty and the case was adjourned to Oct. 2. Defence counsel is Harold Goodwin.

Hubert Francis Croben, Charlottetown, pleaded guilty to a charge of driving without due care and attention and was fined \$20 and costs.

Sangster Sees Plan As Aid To Island Potato Growers

Commenting on Wednesday's meeting, called by Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae, in which potato dealers discussed a schedule of potato prices to growers, marketing director Reid Sangster said "this is a step in the right direction of assuring growers that at all times they will know just how much they can get for their product."

Mr. Sangster said that at the present Toronto price, which is \$1.30 per 75-pound bag of Canada No. 1 table stock potatoes, growers should be getting \$1.00 per bag at the shipping point, or \$1.15 if the grower provides his own bags.

Breaking down the \$1.30 price, Mr. Sangster said that freight costs per bag to Toronto amount to 87 cents, and the dealer gets 13 cents as his commission.

"The freight charge and dealer's commission," he said, "as agreed at the meeting, should stay constant. So if the price in Toronto increases, the return to the grower will increase, correspondingly. Conversely, if Toronto prices decline, the return to the grower declines."

A spokesman for Seeman Brothers (Canada) Ltd., said yesterday that there is absolutely no foundation to rumors of personnel problems at the company's New Annapolis plant.

He was commenting on a story of an employee walkout at the plant over wages.

The spokesman said there was no problem between the company and regular employees at the plant, and none with part-time workers who are paid on a piece-work basis.

He said part-time workers in the area who are working on broccoli and brussels sprouts now they can come to the plant and make a good wage on a piece-work basis.
