COOK'S CORNER

DILL PICKLES

30 cucumbers 4 inches long
2 quarts water
1 cup vinegar
1/2 cup salt

Wash and dry cucumbers. Soak overnight in brine. Drain and wipe and place in jars with sprigs of dill in each jar. Combine water, vinegar and salt. Heat to the boiling point. Cool and pour over cucumbers and seal. A clove of garlic may be added to each jar if desired.



Bake this delicious COFFEE LAYER CAKE.

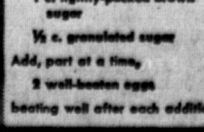
Sift together 3 times

1 1/2 c. once-sifted pastry flour or 1 1/2 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour
2 tsp. Magic Baking Powder
1/2 tsp. baking soda
2 tsp. Instant Cheese & Southern Coffee
1/2 tsp. salt



Combine

3/4 c. milk
1/4 tsp. vanilla
Add dry ingredients to creamed mixture alternately with milk, combining after each addition. Turn into 2 greased 8-inch round cake pans, lined in bottom with greased waxed paper. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375°, 25 to 30 minutes. Put layers of cold cake together with thick raspberry jam between and cover with a coffee-flavored frosting.



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
