HAIR MAKING.—The Ohio Farmer says, the philosophy of hairmaking is, "don't dry it too much." Cut in the blossom and cure in the shade. The sugar of the plant, is in blossom in the stalk ready to form the seeds. If the plant is damaged before it is in flower, or if it is cut, the sugar has become converted to woody matter. Hay should be well wilted in the sun, but cured in the shade. Better to be a little to green than too dry. If, on putting it into the barn, there is danger of loss in the mow, put on some salt. Cattle will like it none the less.

RAISING WHEAT.—John Millmore of Bondville, a practical farmer—informs the Fatten Voice he has not bought a barrel of flour for fifteen years, all of which he has never failed to raise plenty of good wheat. His mode is to plough in June or early in July, turning in the grass; then late in the fall, cross plough, and sow just as early in the following spring as he can get upon the ground, and then use any direction for what except the grass ploughed in, and never fail of a good crop.
