

says so in so many words, and draws a striking picture at the immense addition which Nova Scotia would bring to the naval power of the Union, an increase doubled by the fact that every sailor and ship so obtained would be withdrawn from the resources of Great Britain. We have not the means of compelling a compromise, for Canada cannot give up her tariff suddenly without bankruptcy, and must have under any scheme of Confederation greater power than Nova Scotia. In fact, as it seems to us, we have only to use diplomacy or force; and we strongly trust, but strongly doubt, that the needful ability may be found at the Colonial Office. The negotiations is one which will sorely tax all the skill and all the knowledge of the Duke of Buckingham, and may require the intervention of statesmen of much stronger powers than any his Grace has yet been able to display. The first necessity, however, is that both Parliament and the Colonial Office should realize clearly the seriousness of the colonial agitation."

MEMORANDA.
Schooner *Minnie*, R. McKenzie, arrived in New London Harbor, on the 21st inst., three days from Canso. Reports having been of East Point a vessel sunk in 13 fathoms water—apparently American—Mainmast broken off at deck and afloat, held by the main rigging at head. Foremast broke off about 50 feet from deck. Main boom broke off at the strings, held by the main sheet. Spars pine. Probably she is Schooner *Fishion*, a fishing vessel lost last season, belonging to Cape Ann.

This report was handed to us by Captain John McKenzie, who examined her with a boat. Persons wishing further particulars can have them by applying to Capt. George McKenzie, French River, New London.

We had the pleasure on Sunday last, of visiting the Wesleyan Sunday School, in Charlottetown, under the superintendence of Wm. Brown and Wm. Stumbles, Esqs. We were highly pleased with the appearance and conduct of the children, especially that portion of them under the care of Miss Julia Duchemin. This young lady has the care of over one hundred little ones, and the readiness with which they answered the questions put to them by a stranger, convinced us that her labor was not in vain. We know of no more pleasing sight than to see four or five hundred children, such as we witnessed there, all engaged in perusing that book that is able to make them "wise unto salvation."—May those devoted men and women who are thus engaged in teaching the youth, never grow weary in well doing, for in due season they shall reap their reward."

The Government have granted £3000 to be distributed among or loaned to those of our population who are without seed grain. Each individual can have four pounds, to be paid next fall with interest. This is what we suggested last week, only we thought there should be no interest. We are content. These wise men know best.

We have received a letter in reply to "Farmer," published in the *Patriot* a few days ago. We see no good in publishing it, as we know the country is not so bad off as that writer would have us believe. We agree with our correspondent that if the people are so bad off "Farmer" should sell his turnip and timothy seed a little cheaper, and keep better posted up.

We were shown the other day a very fine mare, owned by the Hon. J. C. Pope. She is sired by the imported mare and the "Sambro." She is only three years old, and is, without exception, the largest and best built colt of her age we have ever seen on this Island.

ERRATA.—We stated last week that Mr. Cullip, an Anti-Unionist, was returned for the Dominion Parliament. It should be for the Local Legislature of New Brunswick.

Henry Stewart McNutt, Esq., of Princetown Royalty, has been appointed a Justice of the Peace.

The harbor here is just beginning to open up. Very large bodies of ice are to be seen outside. We think the Steamer will hardly get in here next week, unless we have a heavy wind.

The ice in Charlottetown Harbor is broken up and fast disappearing. Several vessels that were frozen in at the "three tides," made their way up to the wharf.

The Steamers *Princess of Wales* and *Heber Belle*, are nearly ready to commence their work. They have both been newly painted and refitted. The *Princess* is painted a clear white outside, and is beautifully grained throughout most of the inside. It has, no doubt, cost a large sum of money to repair and refit those boats, but it is satisfactory to know that it has been given to our own mechanics and laborers. This is one of the many benefits to be derived from having the boats owned on the Island. If the harbor is clear we may expect the Steamer here next week.

The Steamer *Alhambra* was to leave Boston on Wednesday last for Charlottetown. We learn that she has recently changed hands and that her present owner intends to keep her on the route as formerly. We hope the day is not far distant when the Steam Navigation Company of this Island will have a suitable boat on that route.

We learn that the American Government have put another dollar duty on Mackrel. This makes it \$3 a barrel. They are so much in debt that they have to resort to this to help pay it. What a country to be annexed to!

The weather during the past week has been very fine—such as will make the Farmer's heart glad. The roads are drying up nicely, and many farmers are ploughing.

Last week we stated that the House had risen. We were wrong—all the chickens were not out. It is said they will rise to-morrow.

In one of "Observer's" letters a few weeks since it was stated that the Lathe in Mr. Butcher's establishment was made in Edinburgh. We have been requested to state that that was a mistake. The Lathe was made by G. Plants, of London. We were shown the other day, some specimens of Mr. Plants Geometric Chuck, and we must say that they were really beautiful.

We regret to learn that Mr. Webster, late master of the Normal School, died at his residence, in Charlottetown, on Tuesday morning last at 6 o'clock. He was a very quiet, inoffensive gentleman, and beloved and respected by all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. He was a native of Nova Scotia. We deeply sympathize with his partner, who is so summarily deprived of a kind and affectionate husband.

Latest by Telegraph!

Paris, April 12—Sunday.
The *Monitor* to-day published an official report made to the Emperor by the Minister Pinard, in which an account is given of the military changes made since the bill for the reorganization of the army has gone into operation, and of effect they have had on the country.

The Minister states that all the reforms introduced into the *Guardie Mobile*, in accordance with the provisions of the bill, are now completed, and he asserts that these changes have been received with popular applause almost everywhere throughout the Empire.

He contradicts reports of dissatisfaction and declares that the new Army Law is sustained and defended by the patriotism of the French people, who thus give new proof of their confidence in the Emperor.

New York, April 13th.

A special despatch to the *Herald* from Mazatlan, Mexico, says:—

"The British frigate *Chanticleer* is closely watching the movements of our fleet in Mexican waters and along the California and Gulf coasts. When it became known that thirteen Mexican men-of-war were in port at one time, the wildest rumors were put about—that the U. S. Government intended to make forcible possession of Mexico and immediately interfere in the civil war in this State. Another report followed, that a large American naval fleet was calling and steaming here with all haste."

Montreal Banks have exported \$120,000 American silver, in order to lessen the inconvenience occasioned by the excessive quantity in circulation.

New York gold market steady and unchanged.

London, April 13th.

Official despatches from Gen. Napier in command of the Abyssinian expedition have been received by the Government. They show that in spite of the bad roads the British forces are steadily advancing towards Magdala. Meanwhile there is every evidence of the intention of the King of Abyssinia to offer serious resistance.

Gen. Napier in his latest despatch, Mar. 17th, says our advance will reach Lake A-hange to-morrow; the rear with the artillery and supply trains is three days' march behind. The country is mountainous and very difficult for the artillery trains.

King Theodoros is near Magdala, where he intends to make a stand. Letters from the captives say they are well. The health of the troops is good. The effective force under Gen. Napier, now advancing on Magdala, numbers 3000 men.

Ottawa, Canada, April 13.

The funeral of the late Mr. McGee took place this morning, and was one of the most impressive ceremonies ever witnessed in Canada. All classes, creeds and nationalities united to pay the last tribute of respect to the lamented statesman. Business was entirely suspended throughout the city. Flags at half mast. Many buildings were draped in mourning, and others in notices in black and white letters.

Procession reached St. Patrick's Cathedral at ten o'clock, where Rev. Mr. O'Farrell preached an eloquent sermon. Procession afterwards proceeded to the French Parish Church, where after singing and a short address made by the Bishop, then returned and took up lines of march to the Roman Catholic Cemetery, where the body was interred. Minute guns fired and bells tolled during the entire services, which lasted till 5 o'clock. It is estimated that not less than 40,000 persons were in the streets and 30,000 in the procession.

Ottawa, April 13.

In the House last night a special committee was appointed on motion of Rose to consider subjects of Banking and Currency.

Some Progress made in voting the estimates.

Mr. McDonald of Lunenburg moved to reduce salaries of Lieut. Governors of Quebec and Ontario to the same as proposed by New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, but did not press amendment to division.

Other four persons arrested in Montreal for Mr. McGee's murder arrived here by forenoon train.

It was rumored in Ottawa on Thursday last, that Whelan was making a "clean breast" to the authorities; this was afterwards denied. As to Doyle and others, it is believed enough has dropped from them to urge the authorities to extra efforts. Quite a change had come on Whelan. He grieved like a boy when brought out of his cell, and seems to be unstrung.

The authorities are daily receiving additional evidence against James Whelan. To-day footprints were discovered in the snow in the vacant lot in Sparks street, opposite the spot where the murder was committed, which correspond with the prints worn by Whelan. The authorities are convinced that a gang of men was connected with the murder, and are gathering evidence which will enable them to discover the whole plot. They are confident that Whelan is the man who fired the fatal shot.

Hon. James Duncan is at present in Ottawa looking after a steambot subsidy between the Island and the mainland. It is strange that such a big anti-Unionist as he is would seek any assistance from the hated Canadians.—*His Reporter.*

The men of H. M. 15th Regt., stationed at St. John, appear to have dealt very extensively in matrimony during their residence there. The Regt. is shortly to be removed to the West Indies, and the *Telegraph* says that the story on the streets is that there are at least 250 women, wives of the soldiers, who will not be permitted to accompany their husbands, the latter having married without the sanction of the military authorities.—*Id.*

ORDERED, That the following Resolutions adopted by the House, this day, be inserted once in each of the newspapers published in Charlottetown.
JOHN MCNEILL, C. H. A.

RESOLVED, That the sum of Three thousand pounds be granted and placed at the disposal of the Government, to be advanced in sums not exceeding four pounds, to any one individual, to parties whose circumstances of destitution are such that they cannot obtain or purchase sufficient seed grain for their farms; the same to be divided as follows:—
Nine hundred pounds to each County, and three hundred pounds in hands of the governing authorities, in cases and emergencies.
One or more Committees to be appointed in each Road District, to whom shall be entrusted the distribution of the amount allotted to the District. The repayment of the several sums advanced, to be secured by joint notes, payable to the Treasurer, with interest at six per cent., on the first day of December next, and the several amounts when due to be payable to such persons or persons as the Government, from time to time, shall appoint.
The Lieutenant Government in Council, if they think fit, may raise the said sum of three thousand pounds, by issuing debentures chargeable on the public funds of this Island, payable at such time as the Government shall appoint, and bearing interest at a rate not exceeding six per cent. per annum.

RESOLVED, That the sum of nine hundred pounds, granted by the last preceding resolution to be distributed in each county, to assist destitute persons in purchasing seed grain, be divided between the several Road Districts thereof as follows:—
