Legislative Council Election.

THE contest has resulted in the return of four supporters of the Government and three Oppositionists. We have to congratulate Messrs. Poole and Campbell on their election by good majorities. It is regretted that the return of the Government candidates for the Second District of Queen's is not by larger majorities. In respect to the election of men of proved ability and respectability, such as Messrs. Nicholson and Ross, the candidates of an economical and honest Government, there should be no uncertainty whatever. The majorities should be large and undoubted.

Not much political interest was taken in the election. The feeling of the people is, apparently, that one legislative chamber is enough to come out and vote for. So strong is this feeling, that it was with difficulty that electors could be induced to vote even for the purpose of expressing their condemnation of the action of the Opposition in respect to the mortgage vote, or their approval of a Government which has proved itself the farmer's best friend. As usual, the Oppositionists were much more zealous and active than the upholders of the Government. The "outs" always strive hard to get in, and they did their utmost to defeat the Government candidates. But they have not, with all their striving, gained anything by the contest of yesterday. They are not stronger in the Legislative Council than they were during the past few years. But the Government has gained an additional seat.

The Potato Bug.

We learn with regret that the potato bug seems to be getting a foothold in this Province. There has been too much laxness towards this pest. The greatest care and watchfulness should now be exercised in respect to it. Paris Green should not be spared. Once established here, the bug will be as hard to get rid of as the Canada thistle or the oxeyed daisy; and it will be much more mischievous.

Board of Health Meeting.

AN emergency meeting of the Board of Health was held yesterday afternoon at four o'clock, Hon. T. H. Haviland presiding. Besides the chairman there were present, Dr. Johnson, Hon. David Laird, and Messrs. Morris, Taylor, Large, Eden and McCarron. The chairman explained that the meeting was called in consequence of the following letter received from Messrs. R. H. Palmer & Co.:

CHARLOTTETOWN, July 29, 1890.

His Worship the Mayor and City Council, City of Charlottetown:

GENTLEMEN.—We would respectfully beg to draw your attention to the broken sewer leading from the Dominion Building to the end of Great George Street. The break is situated abreast of our factory, above high water mark. The stench arising from this sewer is unbearable, and sickens the men, who are continually complaining about it and say they cannot work.

We were yesterday contemplating closing down on account of the state of the air in and around the factory.

We called the attention of the Health Officer, Dr. Johnson, to this matter, but he said he could do nothing with it.

We would wish you to call an emergency meeting immediately, and have the nuisance removed at once, as we cannot put up with it any longer.

The chairman then read the resolution granting permission to build the drain or sewer in question. This resolution, which passed at a meeting of the City Council held on the 9th of August, 1886, reads as follows:—

Resolved, that the prayer of the petition of Messrs. Stilling & Harris, architects, on behalf of the Dominion Government, asking permission to open a drain from the new Post Office on Queen Square, be granted, provided that said drain be opened to the channel of the Hillsborough River, in such a manner as not to cause a nuisance, and that the same be maintained and repaired when constructed by the Dominion Government.

After some discussion, the following resolution, moved by Mr. Eden and seconded by Mr. Taylor, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That Mr. W. C. Harris, the Dominion Architect, be notified that the drain from the Dominion Building to the shore in front of Great George Street, is discharging foul water and filth above high-water mark instead of at the channel of Hillsborough River, and unless the nuisance is at once abated the Board of Health will issue orders to close up all the water-closets and urinals in the Dominion Building.

The Clerk was instructed to furnish Mr. Harris with a copy of this resolution forthwith.

The meeting adjourned sine die.

The New Coadjutor.

THE Rev. James Charles Macdonald, recently appointed Bishop of Irina and Coadjutor to His Lordship Bishop McIntyre, is a son of John and Ellen Macdonald, and was born at Alisary, in the parish of St. Andrew, on the 15th July, 1840. He entered St. Dunstan's College as a student in 1866, remaining there until 1870, when he went to Montreal, where he attended the Grand Seminary. On the 4th of July, 1873, he was ordained to the priesthood by the Bishop of Charlottetown, and at once proceeded to St. Dunstan's College as professor. In 1875 he was appointed to the Missions of St. James, Georgetown, and All Saints, Cardigan Bridge, and in 1876 St. Cuthbert's Mission was added to these, but two years later, in 1878, it was placed in the care of Rev. M. J. McMillan. In 1881 the late Very Rev. Dr. Macdonald was associated with "Father Charles" in the care of the Missions of St. James and All Saints, to which the Mission of St. Paul's, Sturgeon, was then added. However, in September, 1884, to the very great regret of his parishioners, "Father Charles" was removed from his charge and installed as Rector of St. Dunstan's College, which position he still holds. Under the guidance of "Father Charles" the College has been very prosperous, and it now occupies a foremost place among the educational institutions of the Dominion.
