

12 Vessels Make Progress In History-Making Voyage

MONTREAL (CP)—The parade of 12 ocean vessels, freed from a months' imprisonment in ice-locked Montreal harbor, reached the city Wednesday in their history-making mid-winter voyage down the St. Lawrence River.

All but one prepared to drop anchor off Trois-Rivieres, 90 miles from Montreal, as darkness began to set in. Night navigation aids were removed for the winter long ago.

The British cargo liner Beaverford, first in the long, strung-out parade that left Montreal with two icebreakers, continued on past Trois-Rivieres for Quebec City where she will take on cargo.

The Beaverford still had daylight left when she was reported passing Grandines, 41 miles from Quebec City.

MOVE OUT EARLY

The 12 ships began moving out from their berths, scattered along Montreal harbor, as early as 6:30 a.m. By 10 a.m. the stately procession was well under way

through snaky channels carved by icebreakers after weeks and weeks of a task that at times seemed almost hopeless.

The icebreakers d'Arville led the way. The Ernest Lapointe, a smaller icebreaker, brought up the rear.

Between them, in this order, were the Beaverford, the Dutch ship Prins Frederik Hendrik, the Swedish ships Vaxholm and Rydholm, the Norwegian Elin Haven, the Italian Capo Miseno, the German Christa, the Liberian Kali L., the British Appleford, the Swedish Torsholm, the Norwegian Ouna County and the German Luisa Bornhofen.

The d'Arville went on to Trois-Rivieres. The Ernest Lapointe dropped out at Sorel, about 40 miles downstream, to goot 40 miles downstream, to go to work in the Richelieu River.

SETS SLOW PACE

The d'Arville set a slow, methodical pace for the convoy. There was no attempt at speed. Fast-churning propellers could

loosen ice on both sides of the narrow channel and cause further complications.

As early as Dec. 1 ice began to form in the harbor basins and in the Lachine Canal. By Dec. 4 ice was threatening to trap 34 ocean ships in the canal system.

It was early for a real freeze-up. The last two ships to escape from the canal made it safely Dec. 16. There then were 11 ships icebound further down the river and 19 at Montreal. The 11 were freed Dec. 18. Five at Montreal East, a few miles east of the harbor proper, were freed by an icebreaker Dec. 20. Another was freed just east of the harbor Dec. 22.

A series of new ice jams downstream and sub-zero weather hampered further progress until the d'Arville began making her way toward Montreal Dec. 30. Last weekend she reached the German freighter Roseidon, in the east end of the harbor. The Roseidon sailed alone last Monday.

Reymonds Acquire Lease On Dalvay Summer Resort

"Dalvay-by-the-Sea", once the home of an American millionaire, the residence of the wife of an Italian Prince, and at present one of Prince Edward Island's top tourist attractions, will be under new management next season.

Mr. and Mrs. Raoul Reymond of Charlottetown have acquired a lease on the property owned by the national parks branch of the department of northern affairs and natural resources.

The Reymonds will also continue to manage Stanhope Beach Inn which they have operated for several years.

Located at Grand Tracadie 16 miles from the city the beautiful summer resort has been a haven of tourists for many years. It now has 25 guest rooms, and two cottages with a total of seven rooms. It has facilities for lawn bowling, tennis, boating and swimming.

It was built as a summer residence in 1897 by a Cincinnati millionaire, Alexander MacDonal, who was a partner of John D. Rockefeller. Mr. MacDonal gave it the name it still bears today.

Mr. MacDonal continued to use the stately mansion until 1910, and his granddaughter who was married to the Italian Prince Rostigliosi enjoyed its comfort and beauty until 1915.

GIVEN CARETAKER

Following the First World War the property was given by the Prince and his wife to the caretaker, William Hughes of Charlottetown who in turn sold it to a brother of the late Bishop

Draws \$35 Fine On Liquor Charge

The lobsters were purchased by a summer visitor to the Island who was so impressed with the quality of Island-packed lobsters last summer that she took 96 cans home with her. When her friends there were impressed her supply dwindled rapidly.

Needing more for her own use she wrote the person from whom she had purchased the previous lot and asked for an additional 48 cans which figure in the present complaint.

A total of 12 North York officers were charged three months ago with similar offences.

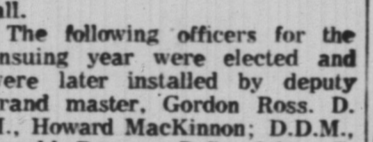
