

SUPREME COURT.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

John W. Kilbride v. Alfred E. Long and another. Action for damages for neglect and carelessness of defendant, who are medical doctors, in setting a dislocated shoulder. Tried at Summerside in June last when plaintiff was given a verdict for \$500. Rule for non-suit or new trial argued Michaelmas Term last. The Court today delivered judgment discharging the rule with costs. Mr. Justice Hodgson dissenting holding that plaintiff should be nonsuited.

Jacob Best vs. Executors of John Gaffney. Action for damages against sheriff. Judgment by default. A rule to show cause why a writ of inquiry to assess the damages and all proceedings thereon should not be set aside on the ground that the writ was tested and made returnable in vacation instead of in term was argued last Michaelmas Term. Today the court gave judgment holding that the writ was properly made returnable in vacation but that if issued in vacation it should have been tested on the last day of the preceding term. Court ordered accordingly with costs against plaintiff fixed at \$10.

Rose Simpson vs. Thompson and Robertson. Action of damages against securities of sheriff. Tried in June last when judgment was given for defendants. Rule for new trial argued Michaelmas Term last.

The court today gave judgment discharging the rule for new trial with costs.

In the matter of the estate of the late Wm. Dodd. An appeal from the Decree of the Surrogate and Judge of Probate on a question of law as to the construction of a certain section of "The Intestacy Act."
