## Ferries Run At Capacity As People Head Home

Both ferry runs to the island yesterday were operating at capacity as the Old Home Week Rush began.

At Borden officials reported that almost every ferry making the trip was filled completely

during the day, and line-ups on the New Brunswick side sometimes were heavy, but the regular ferry runs proved sufficient to handle the traffic.

Northumberland Ferries at Wood Islands and the CNR ferry system at Borden had both re-

ported willingness to make extra runs to handle traffic if conditions warranted it, but last night this expediency appeared unnecessary.

Traffic at Wood Islands was heavy both ways throughout the day, but it was described as "no heavier than usual." Summer traffic there has been steadily good, and there was nothing to base any increase on the assumption of extra numbers because of Old Home Week, it was stated.

The Tourist Information Bureau around the island were forced during the evening to warn tourists that line-ups at Wood Islands for the trip across to Nova Scotia were already too heavy, and that there would be little possibility of making a ferry there after about 5 o'clock, however.

Information bureaus provide word of the latest ferry conditions at both points, and tourists can consult with the nearest one before leaving for the ferry.
