17 Cases Are Heard In Georgetown Court

Kings County Stipendiary Magistrate, James B. Johnston, Q.C., presided over the regular sitting of the Magistrate's Court held at Georgetown on Wednesday, March 9th. There were 17 cases heard.

John Charles Martell of Georgetown, charged with failing to stop his vehicle when signalled to do so by a peace officer; and also charged on three other counts including causing a disturbance in a public place,

by fighting; assaulting Brian Curley and break and entering the home of Dennis Mossman of Souris and committing an offence of assault therein. Martell informed the Court that he would be represented by counsel, and the four charges against him were adjourned to March 23rd, to set a date for hearing.

Ernest Owen Roach of Georgetown, also informed the court he will be represented by counsel. Roach is charged with breaking and entering the home of Dennis Mossman of Souris and committing mischief, by doing damage to property. His case was adjourned to March 23rd.

pleaded not guilty to traffic court, informed the court that he was being represented by J. P. Nicholson and his case was adjourned to March 23rd.

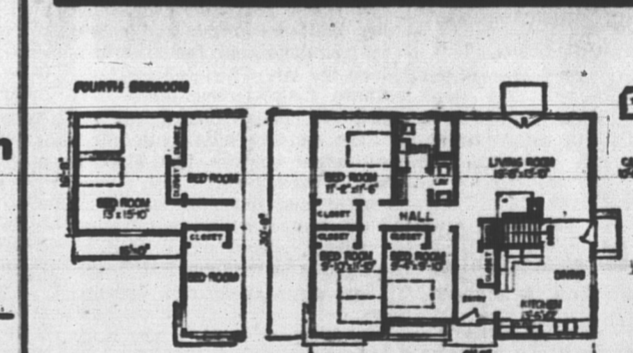
