### Real Camp Slumgullion A Ritzy Robust Repast

WHO wants to take time out from sunning and surfing to cook a hearty outdoor meal? Yet who doesn't love a robust repast after a day at the beach? This "coffee-can meal," re-cooked and packed ready to eat and eat at ocean-side, is the delicious answer.

Our recipe for Ritzy Slumgullion is just right for three couples to enjoy at a camp-cooking. The food is pre-cooked and then divided into three empty coffee cans, sealed with the plastic tops, or foil covers, then reheated, with foil covering, at meal-time.

This meal-in-a-can is so hearty, it needs only canned brown bread and plenty of delicious coffee as accompaniments. Incidentally, Ritzy Slumgullion, served over hot noodles, is great for a teenage party.

Measurements level; recipes for 6

RITZY SLUMGULLION  
4 slices bacon, cut in small squares  
1 medium onion, peeled and chopped  
1 (1 lb.) can tomatoes  
2 (1 lb.) cans red kidney beans, drained  
1 (12 oz.) can kernel corn, drained  
1 (3 oz.) can broiled mushrooms, with liquid  
1 (10 1/2 oz.) can beef flavored mushroom gravy  
1 lb. sharp Cheddar cheese, grated

2 (12 oz. each) cans frank Fry bacon crisp. Drain on absorbent paper; set aside. Cook onion in 2 tsp of bacon drippings until soft but not brown. Add next 6 ingredients. Bring to boiling point. Add cheese. Stir until cheese melts.

Cut frankfurters in thirds. Add with bacon bits to other ingredients. Bring to serving temperature. When ready to serve, heat on grill. If can tops are plastic, place with aluminum foil before putting on grill. Pass sliced canned brown bread.

CAMP (REAL CAMP) COFFEE  
Measure the water into a clean pot and let boil. You'll need 3/4 measuring cup per serving. When the water comes to a boil, move the pot to one side so the water stays hot, but is not actually boiling; add two level measuring cups of one approved coffee (measure) of regular grind coffee for each serving. Stir the brew for half a minute and then let it steep over low heat for 6 to 8 minutes. A few drops of cold water
