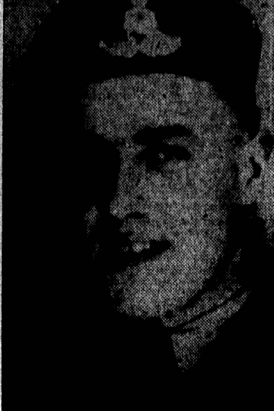

**Fire Fighting Clothing For Montague Dept.**

During the past week there arrived by shipment to Montague, fire fighting clothes for the local fire department. Included in the shipment are fire coats, helmets and hip rubber boots. For several years the fire fighting unit has been lacking these necessities, and now the time has finally arrived when they will be protected while in the performance of their service which is completely voluntary.

It has also been learned that two-hundred feet of two and half inch hose has been ordered which will couple to the present hose of which there is over 1,500 feet, enabling the firemen to reach almost any home within the town limits.

Following a discussion with certain authorities, it was learned that the chemical, although efficient in putting out a small fire, did some harm to fabrics. Taking this into consideration, the department has purchased two 5-gallon steam pump extinguishers to be used wherever there are fabrics, on a small fire requiring quick action.

The department intends to hold a meeting and fire drill within the near future, and with the equipment kept in constant readiness, the residents of Montague are assured that all is being done to protect their property as much as possible from the ravages of fire.

**All Dead Aboard Missing Plane**

EDMONTON, Feb. 9—(CP)—Wreckage of a civilian plane missing since Wednesday night in Central Alberta was found late today on a farm 50 miles southwest of Edmonton. All three occupants of the plane were dead.

Aboard were the pilot, Leslie Robinson, 31, and owner Elizee A. Mailloix, 36, both of St. Paul, Alta., and Alvin Bedard, 34, of Edmonton.

Two farmers of the Calmar district, Charlie Torrence and Bill Nunn, found the wreckage. "We found the plane pancaked in an open field," Torrence said. "It did not hit any obstruction and it did not burn. All of the occupants were dead."

The plane, a single-engined Cessna was on a 200-mile flight funeral was held from her late residence to St. Mary's Church on Feb. 9. Sincere sympathy is extended to the bereaved family.

ATHENS, Feb. 9—(AP)—The Ministry of Transport announced today that freight trains will resume operations between Greece and Yugoslavia Feb. 24. Passenger service is expected to be resumed later. Rail traffic between the two countries has been stopped since the Communist guerrilla war.

**Is Ordered Home From Nanking Mission**

OTTAWA, Feb. 8—(CP)—Chester Romning's strange five-year vigil on the banks of China's Yangtze River should soon be over. The man in charge of what used to be the Canadian Diplomatic Mission in Nanking has been told he can come home, the External Affairs Department said yesterday. He's coming home on leave.

He will leave behind the famous prefabricated buildings Canada sent to Nanking several years ago because there were no satisfactory buildings available there at reasonable prices.

Since the Communists took over in China, the Nanking Mission has had no official status. Nanking is no longer the capital of anything. Canada didn't recognize the Communists but she did keep Mr. Romning on in Nanking, partly at least to look after the prefabricated property.

The Communists have allowed Mr. Romning to stay on in Nanking. His departure— he has been told to come when he sees fit— will leave on the mainland of China two Canadian officials, two consuls at Shanghai. The Communists don't recognize them either.
