Tignish Centenary Celebration to-morrow

COURT MOUNT STEPHEN.—Brethren of this court will please remember their regular meeting to night.

STRAWBERRIES EXPORTED.—A number of boxes of strawberries were shipped by the Princess this morning.

AT TIGNISH TO-MORROW.—There is no doubt but that the elaborate preparations made to celebrate the centenary of Tignish parish will attract many people to that place to-morrow. A varied programme has been arranged and all that is interesting in connection with that portion of our province will be in evidence to-morrow. The extremely low railway fare of only \$1.25 by special train from Charlottetown to Tignish and return should impel many to make this interesting visit.

MILITIA NEWS.—There is a probability that Major General Hutton, commanding the forces in Canada may pay this Province a visit before very long. In fact it is hinted that next month may bring him here in connection with the visit of Lord Minto. It is understood that if such be the case our local militia will most likely have to pass an inspection by the Major General whose well known opinion regarding the need of thorough efficiency in all branches of the militia service are too well known to need repeating here. In the event of the visit being paid, it will most likely result in all the three of the town companies being paraded and probably the country companies also. It is rumored that an effort is being made to organize a march, possibly to Pownal, or some other spot, exercise the men while they are volley-firing, then bringing the men back to town awarding points to the sections performing the work most expeditiously and coming back in best condition.

THE THIRD TRIP.—The Grand Duchess, due here last night, owing to the fog, did not arrive until shortly after eleven this morning. She brought upwards of three hundred passengers, one hundred and forty of whom were to this port, and the rest making the round trip.
