

Commission Hears Accountants Report

TORONTO (CP)—A one-way flow of funds to a financially unsuccessful hotel in the Bahamas from Toronto was outlined recently in a report of a commission inquiring into the collapse of Atlantic Acceptance Corp. Ltd. last year.

John Burn, chartered accountant retained by the royal commission, said Atlantic and its subsidiaries and associates put \$11,325,149 into the Lucayan Beach Hotel Co. Ltd. and related enterprises at Freeport, Grand Bahama Island.

At least \$450,000 of the funds, and possibly \$750,000, was an outright gift, Mr. Burn said.

In the first four months of its operation, beginning January, 1964, the hotel reported a loss of \$29,437 without providing for depreciation on fixed assets of nearly \$8,000,000, he said.

The losses increased during the summer and the next financial statement, which appeared in September 1964, showed a \$461,287 loss, again with no depreciation.

SHOWED \$35,000 LOSS

And, a third statement covering March-May, 1965, also showed a loss of about \$35,000.

Trial Television Program To Begin A Month Earlier

OTTAWA (CP)—Introduction of trial color television programs in Canada will begin Sept. 1, a month earlier than originally announced, State Secretary LaMarsh has told the Commons.

She said the change was requested by broadcasting authorities and was due to quick advances made by both CBC and private stations.

It would thus allow color TV to be brought in with the advent of the fall television programs.

Miss LaMarsh noted that authorized stations have been sending color programs after the close of regular programs since July 1. The trial period when color TV would become part of the regular programs was to start Oct. 1.

"This timetable had been acceptable to all Broadcasters had advanced more quickly than originally anticipated. Representations, particularly by the Canadian Association of Broadcasters, had asked for an earlier start."

Miss LaMarsh said the CBC would have to make the adjustment with no increase in its budget. This was in line with government policy announced in the recent white paper on broadcasting.

L. R. (Bud) Sherman (PC—Winnipeg South) said he and his party welcomed the minister's announcement but that extension of television service to the north and other unserved areas "should be of primary priority."

However, color television could make an important contribution to Canadian unity. Canadians across the country would be able to experience "in living color the beauties of this land and all its regions."

SURVIVE PLANE CRASH

MADRID (AP)—A U.S. Air Force C-47 transport plane brushed wings with one of Spanish F-104 jet fighter planes Friday while approaching Torrejon military air base here and crashed, air force officials reported. All nine occupants of the transport which fell six miles south of the runway, survived, officials said. Both Spanish fighter planes landed safely.

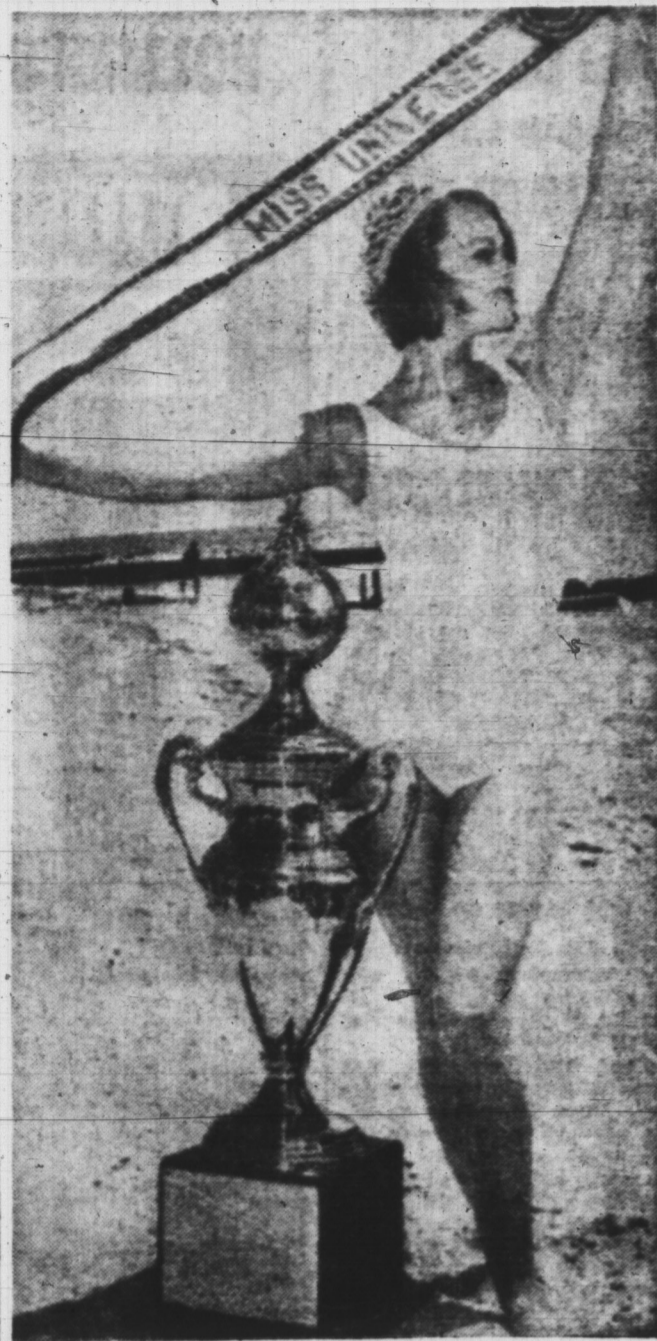
