COAL ADVANCING.—A late New York despatch says the sales agents of the great six coal producing companies have decided to advance the price of stove and chestnut coal twenty-five cents per ton, and egg fifteen cents. Broken remains unchanged. It was decided to restrict the production of June to 2,750,000 tons.

The divinity thesis was "The Fatherhood of God," 1st, as exhibited by the inductive method from the Holy Scriptures; 2nd, as exhibited by intentional philosophical research, and in the Christian consciousness; 3d, as exhibited in the special phases, viz: God as producing Father in natural law and in direct creations; God as providing Father; God as educating Father; God as redeeming Father; God as governing Father; God as universe Father. The University divinity hood is black silk, lined with garnet silk, and bordered with white ermine.

Mount Allison College.

SACKVILLE, May 29.

The Board of Managers of Mount Allison College have been in session yesterday and to day. The resignation of Dr. Bura h was tendered and accepted, the Board, by resolution, expressing regret at his departure. Principal Davis, of the Male Academy, has also resigned. No appointments have been made to the vacant positions. It is proposed to make a new departure by providing a course of lectures on Constitutional Law and Jurisprudence. A number of leading lawyers in the two provinces will be invited to take part in the course.

Movements of Royalty.

QUEBEC, May 29.

The Duke and Duchess of Connaught are not expected to pass through Quebec next week on their way to the salmon fisheries. They will go by the Canadian Pacific Short Line about Wednesday or Thursday of next week to St. John. They will then ascend to the Metapedia for salmon fishing, as the guests of Sir George Stephen. They will arrive in Quebec on the 10th or 11th, where they will be the guests of the Governor-General, accepting a civic address from the Mayor at the Parliament House, and sailing on the 12th of June for Liverpool.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, May 29.

The Minister of Finance has gone to Toronto to attend the banquet of the bankers' section of the Board of Trade this evening. The Royal Society to-day elected Principal Grant President, and Dr. Bourinot, Secretary.

Trade returns for the ten months ended May 1st show an increase of four and a half millions in exports as compared with the corresponding period last year. The duty increased half a million.

The nominations to-day in Ontario show contests in nearly every constituency.

W. C. T. U. Convention.

MONTREAL, May 29.

This was the second day of the third annual convention of the Dominion Women's C. T. U. in Erin Church. Mrs. Foster, president, read the yearly report; Mrs. Fawcett reported on unfermented wine; Mrs. Turnbull, of St. John, read a report on social purity, while Mrs. Lovett dealt with the medical aspect of the case. Miss Willard was enthusiastically received.

News From Halifax.

HALIFAX, May 29.

Diphtheria is very prevalent in Halifax and vicinity. Pickford & Black will place a new steamer on the Western Counties route. Seven thousand five hundred tons of shipping is under construction in Harvis. Nearly all of the firms in Halifax employing metal workers have conceded the nine hours a day system. The workers will celebrate the event by a grand turn out on Labor Day, July 23rd.

The Newfoundland Trouble.

TORONTO, May 29.

A special cable despatch to the Globe says: The unofficial Newfoundland delegates, I hear, are well satisfied with the result of their labors here so far. The press has given a favorable reception to their views and recognises the importance of the issues and the necessity of a prompt and thorough settlement of the difficulties. Above all there is reason to believe the delegates have been successful in convincing Lord Knutford of the strong grounds which the case rests upon. The delegates hope to have an interview with Lord Salisbury shortly after the present recess.

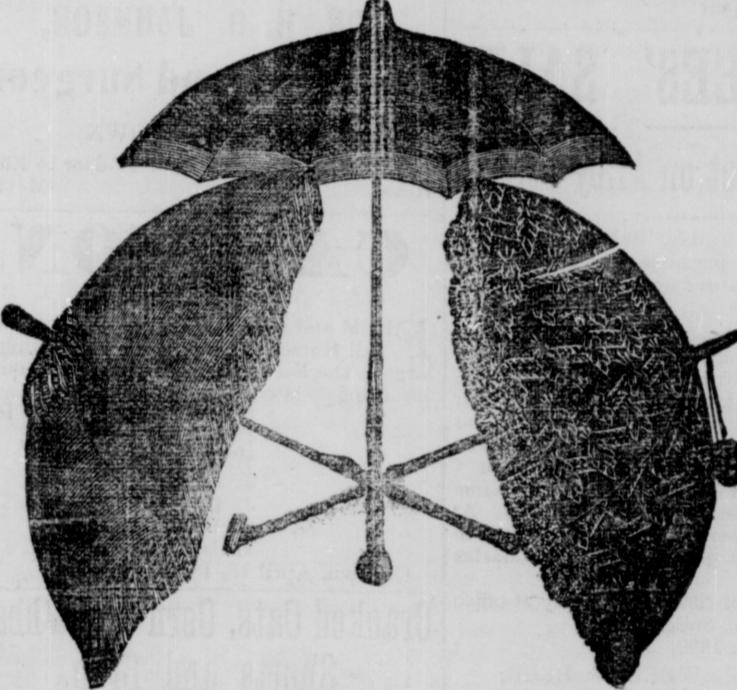
