## Junior Drama Festival Play-Off At Kinkora

The Prince County play-offs in the Junior Drama Festival were held recently in Kinkora and three groups from Kinkora School presented their one-act plays. Miss Mary Moran, Charlottetown was adjudicator. The winning play was "The Pampered Darling", which was highly commended by the adjudicator for its well-acted performance. Miss Moran noted that the youthful actors achieved even a few professional touches. Special mention was made of the splendid acting of Dr. Rudolf Von Hapeberger, played by Louis Motver, who made an excellent job of a difficult part.
