New York, Dec. 8.—Henry J. Hayden, Vice-President of the New York Central and Hudson River Railway, jumped or fell from the fourth story window of his residence in this city last evening and was killed.

FORTY HOURS DEVOTION.

Imposing Services at Vernon River—New Organ.

Despite the very stormy weather the Forty Hours Devotion took place at St. Joachim's Church, Vernon River, of which Dr. Doyle is rector, on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of this week. St. Joachim's is one of the most imposing ecclesiastical structures in the Province as everybody knows and it looked its best internally during these services. The magnificent marble altar was decorated in the best of taste, choice foliage plants, rich vases and candelabra and a profusion of lights making it a vision of surpassing beauty.

The solemn Mass of Exposition was sung at 8.30 on Tuesday and the Rev. Father Burke, of Alberton, was celebrant with Fathers Johnston and McGuigan deacons and Dr. Doyle himself master of ceremonies. After Mass the procession prescribed by the ritual was made and the litanies chanted. The whole function was most imposing, the music of the choir being particularly good. On Wednesday Rev. Dr. Monaghan chanted the Missa Pro Pace, and on Thursday the Reposition was made by Rev. Father Johnston.

A vast concourse of people attended the services notwithstanding the unfavorable weather and roads.

The Rev. Dr. Doyle contemplates commemorating the 25th anniversary of the laying of the corner stone of St. Joachim's by the inauguration of a splendid pipe organ costing about \$2000, now being built by special contract for him by a celebrated Canadian organ builder. The organ will be a first-class instrument in every way and a fitting complement to St. Joachim's rich and artistic furnishings. Ecclesiastical dignitaries from abroad will participate in the ceremonies, which will be of surpassing brilliance. Already the whole sum necessary to defray the expense of the costly instrument has been subscribed by Dr. Doyle and his parishioners, who are to be congratulated on their enterprise and generosity.
